Heart to Heart....

Back to Basics

Following is an extract from "Regathering Power"* by John Michael Talbot

I remember one particular parish I visited which included a large proportion of wealthy people. The pastor sent me a list of over thirty programs which were attempted over ten years. "John," he lamented. "none of them have worked. You know what we did? We finally determined that programs don't renew the church - only Jesus will renew the church. Without him, none of our best-laid plans are going to make a shred of difference." This particular church declared a moratorium on services. They decided to shut everything down except their Sunday liturgy. They put a headline in their church paper that their church was dead and released a statement to their local newspaper that their parish was dead and Jesus was going to have to resurrect

I went to that parish to share with the people and to find out what they were thinking. This was a parish which was truly interested in Jesus. After one particular service, we got together in a very small room which was packed with about 300 people. After some moments of silence, one person spoke up and said, 'John, we want to be disciples of Jesus Christ. What do we do? We've had enough of programs-we just want to be disciples! We want to get radical. What do we do with our imperfections? What about the poor?" Another spoke up, 'What about our cultural restrictions which don't seem to give us permission to really get excited about God?"

This really scared me. Here was a group of highly expectant and searching people, staring at me, seeking direction. I had to be honest. I told them that we can't truly evangelise until we have been evangelised ourselves. We can't save the world or the church unless we have individually allowed Jesus to evangelise our souls. We simply cannot give what we do not have. This is why in many of our churches, in spite of endless

renewal programs, nothing seems to happen. We need total, personal conversion. Never before has there been such need for Christians to be radical for Christ and to stand united in their faith.

Unless we are interiorly rooted in Christ through the power of the Spirit, our external works cannot really be radical. They will not be effective. So be radical. Then will your soul be renewed. Your life will bear much fruit, allowing you to feed the hungry world with Jesus, the Bread of Life.

I find this extract to be very challenging and moving! I am drawn to the simplicity of the basics of the Gospel. I am reminded of Paul who said "In him (God) we live and move and have our being."

We desperately want things to be better - our lives, the community, the world to change for the good, yet we struggle blindly trying this and that to find a better way.

I believe I am led by God to come back to the message of the Sermon on the Mount to discover what Jesus has spelt out there in terms of what life should be like, how we should live as fellow citizens of the Kingdom of Heaven.

Between now and the end of the year, I am dedicating myself to a series of sermons based on the Sermon on the Mount.

Father, may your kingdom come, your will be done - here in the Parish of Trevallyn and Riverside - as it is in heaven.
