

Heart to Heart....

Where is God at Work in the Parish?

On Saturday 9th September, our parish is having a "Gaining a Vision for the Parish" day at St David's Riverside, chaired by Alister Palmer, the Diocesan Ministry Officer. There is an old saying "The person who aims at nothing is sure to hit it!"

The object is not to come up with some good ideas, rather to prayerfully gain God's direction for the parish. For this to be accomplished effectively, prayer is number one priority. But also sincerity of heart, a real desire to hear God, a willingness to be willing and obedient in following the direction that our Lord gives. In addition, we must remember the importance of realising that God is already at work in this parish. Our task is to discern His activity and become involved with it.

All this can be a bit scary when you consider the first disciples that Jesus called to follow him. There is no indication in the Bible that Jesus explained what the implications would be for them. All they knew as they left their nets and their occupations was simply the call of Jesus to "Follow me".

Below is an extract from Eugene Peterson "The Contemplative Pastor" (Eerdmans) This is to assist us in understanding a little of how God works.

Initiative

In running the church, I (the pastor) seize the initiative. I take charge. I take responsibility for motivation and recruitment, for showing the way, for getting things started. If I don't, things drift. I am aware of the tendency to apathy, the human suscepti-Continued on page 2

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bility to indolence, and I use my leadership position to counter it.

By contrast, the cure of souls* is a cultivated awareness that God has already seized the initiative. The traditional doctrine defining this truth is prevenience: God everywhere and always seizing the initiative. He gets things going. He had and continues to have the first word. Prevenience is the conviction that God has been working diligently, redemptively, and strategically before 1 appeared on the scene, before I was aware there was something here for me to do.

The cure of souls is not indifferent to the realities of human lethargy, naive about congregational recalcitrance, or inattentive to neurotic cussedness. But there is a disciplined, determined conviction that everything (and I mean, precisely, everything) we do is a response to God's first work, his initiating act. We learn to be attentive to the divine action already in process so that the previously unheard word of God is heard, the previously unattended act of God is noticed.

"Running - the-church" questions are: What do we do? How can we get things going again?

"Cure-of-souls" questions are: What has God been doing here? What traces of grace can I discern in this life? What history of love can I read in this group? What has God set in motion that I can get in on?

* Cure of souls = It is the work of the pastor, from the Latin *cura* which has a primary sense of "care"; ie caring for the souls (the people) of the parish.

"Keep Your Fork"

There was a woman who had been diagnosed with a terminal illness and had been given three months to live. So as she was getting her things "in order", she contacted her pastor and had him come to her house to discuss certain aspects of her final wishes. She told him which songs she wanted sung at the service, what Scriptures she would like read, and what outfit she wanted to be buried in. The woman also requested to be buried with her favourite Bible.

Everything was in order and the pastor was preparing to leave when the woman suddenly remembered something very important to her. "There's one more thing," she said excitedly. "What's that?" came the pastor's reply. "This is very important," the woman continued. "I want to be buried with a fork in my right hand." The pastor stood looking at the woman, not knowing quite what to say. "That surprises you, doesn't it?" the woman asked. Well, to be honest, I'm puzzled by the request," said the pastor.

The woman explained. "In all my years of attending church socials and potluck dinners, I always remember that when the dishes of the main course were being cleared, someone would inevitably lean over and say, 'Keep your fork'. It was my favourite part because I knew that something better was coming...like velvety chocolate cake or deep-dish apple pie. Something wonderful, and with substance! So, I just want people to see me there in that casket with a fork in my hand and I want them to wonder "What's with the fork?'. Then I want you to tell them: "Keep your fork....the best is yet to come".

The pastor's eyes welled up tears of joy as he hugged the woman goodbye. He knew this would be one of the last times he would see her before her death. But he also knew that the woman had a better grasp of heaven than he did. She KNEW that something better was coming. At the funeral people were walking by the woman's casket and they saw the pretty dress she was wearing another favourite Bible and the fork placed in her right hand. Over and over, the pastor heard the question "What's with the fork?" And over

and over he smiled.

During his message, the pastor told the people of the conversation he had with the woman shortly before she died. He also told them about the fork and about what it symbolised to her. The pastor told the people how he could not stop thinking about the fork and told them that they probably would not be able to stop thinking about it either. He was right.

So the next time you reach down for your fork, let it remind you oh so gently, that the best is yet to come.
