## RECTOR'S LETTER

My Dear Friends.

I am most grateful for the offers of help which I have received from ladies who are willing to act as district visitors in the parish and distribute this little paper to Church of England families in their neghbourhood. I feel it will be some little time before the whole plan is fully working but I would be much encouraged to have more offers of assistance from those able to help in this way.

This month I have been making a list of all houses within the parish boundaries and I find that there are some 1800 homes at least. This number does not include Trevallyn, Riverside or Cormiston, or those attending St. John's who live outside the parish boundaries. Probably more than 40 per cent of the families represented by these homes would claim membership of the Church of England, but unfortunately in many cases their names are not recorded on our lists. It would be a very great help to us if all parishioners made sure that their names were on the Parish Roll. This can be done by making the following statement, and posting it to the Rectory.

"I, the undersigned, declare that I am of the age of eighteen years and upwards, and claim to be a member of the congregation of St. John's Church. Launceston, in Tasmania. And I also declare that I am a bona fide member of the Church of England in Tasmania, and that I belong to no other religious denomination which is not in communion with that church. Dated at Launceston this--day of-—1950. Signed—

In preparation for Confirmation which is to be held early in October classes will be formed at St. John's in July. I would be glad to have the names and addresses of all who wish to join these classes. As a general rule the Bishop requires that candidates should be not less than twelve years of age. Fourteen years is often found a suitable age.

For the assistance of the clergy a simple form of Notice of Infant Baptism has been prepared. These may be obtained at the Church or from the Rectory. Parents are asked to fill in the form and return it some days beforehand.
