## RECTOR'S LETTER

My Dear Friends,

The annual meeting of the Tasmanian Council of Churches was held recently and revealed that much has been accomplished by the churches working together in co-operation. In Launceston for more than a year, weekly services have been conducted at the General Hospital, and two broadcast sessions given each Sunday over the local stations. From time to time combined gatherings are arranged to hear some prominent visiting speaker, and regular meetings are held when the ministers of the district together with representative laymen confer on matters of common concern and interest. At present a 'Home and Family Week' is being organised to take place in Launceston from 28th September to 5th October. Its purpose is to bring before people the Christian ideals of home and family life as the basis of true happiness for the individual and as the foundation of community welfare. Prominent speakers are coming from the mainland to give addresses and interesting displays and entertainment will be provided in the Albert Hall which will be the centre for meetings and activities. Encouraging co-operation has been shown in plans already made and it is anticipated that the experience of cities in other states and in New Zealand will be repeated here, in the very remarkable interest and influence aroused.

The Tasmanian Council of Churches is in effect the Tasmanian branch of the World Council of Churches. We are all conscious of the great need for more co-operation and unity among the churches than is sometimes apparent. It has been said that we may belong to different regiments and wear different uniforms but we are all soldiers in the one army of the one Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Let us never make the mistake of thinking that Unity is the same as Uniformity. Why should lack of uniformity suggest unhappy divisions? If we are really earnest in our desire for Unity and Co-operation in Religion let us join the Fellowship of the World Council of Churches at an annual subscription of a guinea which goes to meet the cost of administration in Geneva. Australia and Tasmania. We all give much more than this annually to our our church. By this additional payment we will be joining and supporting the only world wide movement

for unity and common action by the Christian churches. I shall be glad to give further information and to accept subscriptions.

We had very encouraging attendances at our Easter services and on behalf of our Churchwardens I would like to thank you for the generous response to the annual Easter appeal. We were very glad that the Rev. A. H. Roake was able to be with us at St. John's and St. Oswald's. We were helped by his addresses.

We are very pleased to hear that Mr. T. G. Shadwick is making a steady recovery after his illness, and would like to thank Mrs. Shadwick for all that she has done to help us despite her worry and anxiety.
