RECTOR'S LETTER

My Dear Friends-

This year the Services on Good Friday and Easter Day seem to have been even more inspiring than usual. Despite the absence of many parishioners at holiday homes our congregations were very encouraging, and I feel sure that all who attended were helped by their worship. We were especially glad to welcome to St. John's on Good Friday night, our brethern from other churches. Rev. R. H. Dean, of Scotch College, preached to a full church, and we are grateful to him for his inspiring message. We were also glad to have with us over the Easter Week-end a party of young people from the Victorian Church of England Fellowship, with whom our own young people had outings and meetings.

The broadcast of our Easter Hymns in the radio session "Community Hymn Singing" was well received. I have received many comments from those who listened-in and a number of former parishioners and friends from Sydney and Melbourne wrote in terms of appreciation. I am grateful to Mr. L. O'Neil and Mr. Ron Fowell for their help.

Last month I was elected the president of the Launceston branch of the Tasmanian Council of Churches which is the regional committee of the World Council of Churches. I feel that it is unfortunate that this organisation has such a long title but it simply indicates the channel accepted by practically all denominations for co-operative work and witness on local and world levels. I greatly value the privilege of taking part in such united services as Anzac Day Commemoration and Empire Youth Sunday Service.

On Thursday, 28th April, we were glad to welcome to St. John's members of the staffs of Launceston Banks. A short service held at 5 p.m. was attended by over 200. The service was arranged by The Bankers' Institute of Australasia. Similar services were held in all capital cities and provincial centres throughout the Commonwealth.

May I commend to your notice the paragraph on another page concerning the Weekly Free-will Offerings scheme. The vestry is very encouraged by the number who have already joined. Many have not yet been approached, and we hope that when the scheme is more widely launched the majority of parishioners will become members.

The Churchwardens would like to express their thanks for the generous response to the annual Easter Appeal.

Ascension Day falls on Thursday, 19th May, It is the day when we remember especially our Lord's last charge to his disciples that they should be witnesses to Him throughout the world. May we ask Him to make us more faithful witnesses both at home and in other lands. Only so will His Kingdom of Peace be spread abroad.

CHURCH MISSIONARY SOCIETY

An African Assistant Bishop for the Diocese of Central Tanganyika will be among four African priests consecrated by the Archbishop of Canterbury at St. Paul's Cathedral, Kampala, Uganda, on Sunday, 15th May. He is the Revd. Yohana Omari, who was ordained by Bishop Chambers in 1938. After serving in many parts of the diocese he was appointed to Dodoma Cathedral last year. He brings many gifts to his new work. Apart from a working knowledge of English, he is fluent in the seven African languages, which will enable him to minister to people in all parts of the diocese. He is an able evangelist, a good convention speaker and a faithful pastor. His years of faithful pioneer missionary work in difficult conditions have helped to fit him for leadership. This appointment is a further indication of the policy being practised by C.M.S. to increase African leadership and set forward the whole plan of the growing indigenous Church.

To mark the importance of the occasion an interchange of pulpits has been arranged. The Revd. Keith

Kay, Rural Dean, will preach at St. John's and the Rector will go to St. Aidan's for the evening service on Sunday, 15th May. As the following Thursday is Ascension Day a special Missionary Service will be held in St. John's that evening at 7.30, when intercessions will be made for the new Bishops and their dioceses. After the service Missionary films will be shown in the Hall and light supper served. A special appeal for the funds of C.M.S. is being made during May and June. Owing to the annual "Summer School" being held this year in mid-October instead of in the current financial year there is an urgent need to increase our funds in order to meet our missionary quota.

FREE-WILL OFFERING SCHEME

A good many people have accepted the invitation to join the Weekly Free-will Offering Scheme and its introduction has obviously been worthwhile. Already over £400 per year has been promised, mostly in quite small weekly amounts, for it is surprising how small amounts add up if given with regularity.

ST. JOHN'S ORGAN

During the past month two improvements have been made to St. John's Organ. In the first place it has been enlarged by the addition of a new stop consisting of 61 pipes called a Clarabel Flute. This stop is of beautiful tone and is a most useful addition. It has been made possible by donations made to a fund for a memorial to the late Arthur R. Gee, who was our Organist for twenty-two years. To this amount was added a legacy left to St. John's by the late Miss Lucy May Hunt. The new stop will be dedicated by the Rector at the 11 o'clock service on Sunday, 15th May.

The second improvement was the installation of a new and more powerful electric motor for driving the fan which supplies the organ with air for the bellows. The old motor had been in service for 30 or more years and was losing power. The cost of the new motor was met by the Choir Fund.

Our organ is one of the glories of St. John's Church. It is probably the finest pipe organ in Tasmania and will always be associated with the memory of G. F. Hopkins, Esq., who was Organist of St. John's and also an organ builder-he constructed the greater part of the instrument himself. However, the action of the organ is a piece of mechanism which in time will begin to show signs of wear. The vestry is at present considering a report that indicates that maintenance work and repairs are needed almost at once if our beautiful instrument is to be kept in firstclass order.
