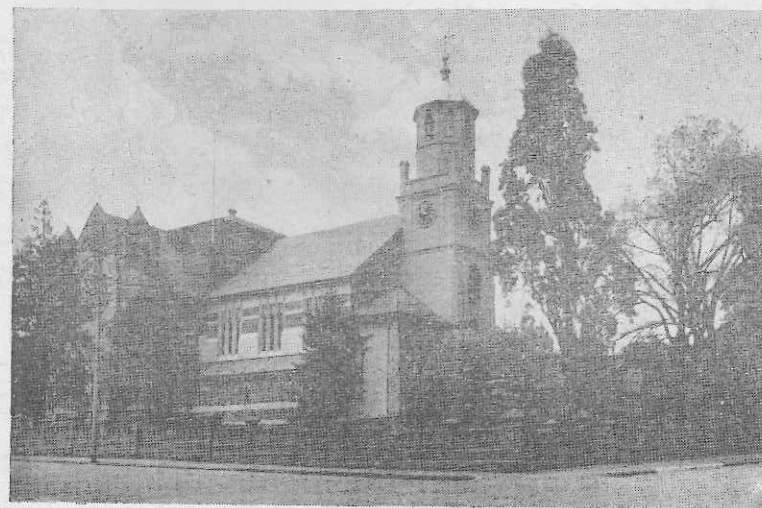

**RECTOR'S LETTER**

My Dear Friends,

We have been encouraged to notice that this year we have had almost twice the number of communicants that we had last year for Ash Wednesday and the first two Sundays in Lent, and almost a hundred more than we had for the same period in 1957. The congregations at the other services have also increased. I hope that this increase will continue. The Lenten season is not only a preparation for Good Friday and Easter, but also a time when our spiritual life is deepened and strengthened.

This month we are to have three visitors from overseas. Dr. Billy Graham will come with all his experience and fervour to preach again the simple Gospel message of Jesus Christ. We hope that many will be led to a point of permanent decision for God as a result of his message. However, it is well that we should remember that it is our duty and solemn responsibility to build upon this awakened interest in spiritual truths. With God's help, by our friendship and example, let us do everything we can to build into the family of God's Church all who come forward. Then a few days later Bishop Omari from Tanganyika will visit us. Few people will have seen an African Bishop before and he will show us by his simple faith and saintliness that Christ's Love and Truth embraces all mankind without distinction of race, language or colour. The same truth was emphasised by the visit of the Revd. Harry Daniel from South India who was in Launceston on the 22nd and 23rd February. Mr. Daniel spoke to us about the urgent need for the Church to be interested in world problems. Third visitor will be the Rev. Frank Byatt of Inter-Church Aid who will tell us of our obligation to help refugees who are suffering in many lands through post war conditions. These Christian leaders together present a united and living commentary on our Lord's words: "I, if I be lifted up from the earth will draw all men unto me."

At last month's meeting of the Vestry it was decided to undertake the renovation, completion and electrification of St. John's Church organ. The matter has been discussed and considered from every angle and it was decided that a complete re-build would in the long run be more economical and far more satisfactory in every way. For many years we have realised that the organ could be maintained in first class order only by undertaking costly repairs. We have decided to do the job properly. A magnificent instrument has been handed down to us from the past free of debt and it is our simple duty to pass it on to those who follow us in the same excellent condition that we received it. It is well known that the Paterson St. Methodist Church Organ and St. David's Cathedral Organ have been recently renovated. Now it is our turn. When the work is completed some time next year St. John's organ will be one of the finest organs in Australia.

Although the details have not yet been finalised (and "there is many a slip between the cup and the lip") Mrs. Sutton and I are making plans to visit England for our daughter's wedding which has been arranged for mid September. The only thing which makes our trip at all possible is the promise of an appointment as a chaplain on a migrant vessel leaving England in November. The vestry and the Bishop have approved of our plans and when they are settled I shall let them be known. It is more than thirty years since I visited England last for post graduate studies in 1927. I am sure that another visit will be most helpful and stimulating.

I have had several enquiries about the class to be formed for those who would like to do some serious study of the Bible, Prayer Book, Church History and Doctrine for the Th. A. diploma of the Australian College of Theology. I would be glad to hear from others interested. We shall start after Easter.

I was present at the service in St. David's Cathedral, Hobart, when the Very Revd. Eric Michael Webber B.D., A.K.C., was installed as the new Dean of Hobart. We extend to him, his wife and young family, our best wishes and welcome as he undertakes his responsible duties. Our congratulations go to our Rural Dean, Canon J. E. Atkins Th.L. who was also installed at the same service.

Praying that this month and season may be a time of spiritual enrichment for us all. With every good wish for a holy and happy Easter.

### BISHOP YOHANA OMARI

About 30 years ago a young Moslem boy attending a C.M.S. School stole a Bible from the school library, his parents had firmly forbidden him to read the Christians' book. The young man came to the words in St. John's Gospel: "I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life: no man cometh unto the Father but by me." This message brought him to the beginning of the great adventure for Christ. To use his own words "That verse pushed me out of the darkness of Islam into the light of Christ." In spite of opposition he dedicated himself to the service of the Lord. He chose the name Yohana (John) as it was that apostle's record through which he was converted. Two years later he was baptised and a year later he was confirmed.

Upon leaving school he spent seven years assisting in a Government dispensary. In a twice-repeated dream Yohana was called to be a pioneer missionary among the tribes-people of Uha, notorious for their fierceness and evil. Here he laboured faithfully for years and won converts. He was then chosen to be trained for the ministry but at first was reluctant to be ordained. After ordination he returned to the Uha country and later in 1946 was transferred to the Central Province. He was consecrated to be Assistant Bishop of Tanganyika on 15th May, 1955 by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

On his visit to Australia Bishop Omari is accompanied by Mr. Festo Kivengere, an African layman who is a master of the C.M.S. secondary school at Dodoma. He is a talented African scholar and has a good grip of the English language.

As announced in another paragraph Bishop Omari will speak at a Missionary Rally in St. John's Hall on Friday, 20th March at 8 p.m. and on the Sunday following will preach at St. John's at night and at a Youth Tea the same afternoon in St. John's Hall at 5 p.m.
