SODEPAX REVIEWS SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS

(Bossey, near Geneva)-"The world is moving as though to a Niagara of chaos..." This was the warning issued by Lady Jackson (Barbara Ward), a British internationally known economist, to clergymen and laymen who are members of the Joint Committee on Society, Development and Peace as they met here at the Ecumenical Institute of the World Council of Churches, July 2 to 6.

Fifty-four participants from thirteen nations met for four days to consider the crucial issues confronting the churches and cultures of the

Development, national and international, was cited as a priority to which all churches, Protestant, Orthodox and Roman Catholic, should address themselves. "The human family", one report stated, "possesses the resources required for world development, but the public and political will to do what is needed is significantly lacking." The report further indicated that "the Church has a unique and vital role to play in this process of forming a public conscience. Perhaps this is her greatest role, one that is more urgent than direct church operation in development."

This was stressed at the annual meeting of the Joint Committee on Society, Development and Peace (SODEPAX), which has been constituted by the World Council of Churches and the Pontifical Commission Justice and Peace to review and examine critically past and present programmes and to suggest future policies programmes. In expressing a desire to join in a Day of World Peace instituted by Pope Paul VI this year, the committee cautioned that "the danger of irrelevant and purely churchly observance of the Day of World Peace could be avoided only in so far as in each region and nation public manifestations of Christian protest against violence and injustice went along with the devout prayers of the faithful."

Such issues, and their theological implications, as education for development, influencing structures (both in societies and churches), and Christian co-operation with men of other faiths and ideologies in social justice, development and peace were also considered by the committee and will be subjects of extensive study by special work groups sponsored by SODEPAX. Co-chairmen of the SODEPAX committee are Mgr. Joseph Gremillion, Secretary of the Pontifical Commission Justice and Peace and Mr. Max Kohnstamm, appointed by the World Council of Churches.

In a concluding statement, the co-chairmen indicated the significant progress which has been made by SODEPAX since its initial meetings such as Beirut in 1968. "This meeting and recent task group meetings around the world", they said, "have exhibited a new awareness on the part of the world-wide Christian community that the massive issues of society, development and peace must be met by equally massive resources and intensive efforts in every region of the world." They called upon "the Church, the churches and every human bearing the name 'Christian' to redouble their efforts and commitment to alleviate suffering and oppression of every kind and to promote the sanctity of every man in the sight of God."
