



We also continued our links with people interstate and overseas — Gerald Crispin at Ridley is remembered with cards at Easter and his birthday, and we have links with M.U. Branches in England, Honiara and Melanesia.

THE POTTER AT WORK

The verse, inscribed on a decorated dish by a Colonial potter, "O Clay I am, it is most true, but scorn me not; for so are you" - should bring us all to the realization that we are mortal. And moreover, should make us humbly understand that, like all living creatures, we have beeen made by our Creator from the very soil beneath our feet - from the earth we live upon. These same thoughts apply to the potter, who, with his wheel spinning before him, brings life to the shapeless mass of clay turning between his hands. As he centres, opens and raises the clay, he comes to the point where it is no longer a mechanical process, but an intuitive and creative undertaking.

When potters gather to discuss their craft, they not only use words like pots, volume, tension, organic, balance, and symmetry, but the word life is also an important part of their vocabulary. Does the object before them have "life?" This is what distinguishes good pieces of pottery from the bad or just plain ordinary. Above all else, a good pot must have life.

Oddly, enough, many beautiful pots have no life, whereas a humble or mis-shapen pot may. Why? It could be that the potter gave the beautiful pot everything but a sense of dignity and purpose. Beauty without purpose is futile.

THE RECTOR'S LETTER



My dear friends,

As we celebrate Easter Day 1983 at the Lord's Table, let us not forget that Good Friday had to take place first. The events of that day have been variably interpreted down the centuries. Individuals have made light of the whole "Christ event", claiming that Jesus was just another idealistic fool who sacrificed his life for nothing. Others have so spiritualized the events of Good Friday that it is seen as something of religious beauty, to be admired. Let us not live in such a fool's paradise.

We are confronted with the evidence of both the Old and New Testaments, plus the witness of countless Christians in the Church down the centuries. They speak of the reality of the Christ of Golgotha in their lives, the new life He has obtained for them, the release and freedom they have experienced because of the the Lord Jesus Christ and what happened on Good Friday. The close comparison between what was foretold in Isaiah Chapter 53 and the events centuries later, as recorded e.g. in St. Matthew's Gospel, chapter 27, should challenge our attention to the detail.

The Isaiah passage clearly states that "The Servant", verse 7, "was oppressed and afflicted." In verse 8, "he was cut off from the land of the living"; verse 9, "he was assigned a grave with the wicked"; verse 10, "he poured out his life unto death, and was numbered with the transgressors." Well may we ask, "why did all this have to happen?" If again we turn to Isaiah chapter 53, the scriptures give us the answers. Verse 8, "for the transgression of my people he was stricken"; verse 10, "the Lord made his life a guilt offering"; verse 11, "by his knowledge my righteous servant will justify many, and he will bear their iniquities"; verse 12, "he bore the sins of many, and made intercession for the transgressors.'

Our society is putting on a bold front. Underneath the facade people are bearing terrible guilt. All around us is corruption and while people may fool some of us some of the time they cannot fool themselves or God forever. Eventually the truth comes home to rest and usually at a time when individuals are least able to cope. Since last Easter the news media have highlighted the sorry tale of human misery, of mistakes made, suffering caused, court action taken. The terrible cost of loose talk and gossip which destroys other people's credibility; the psychological and spiritual damage inflicted by cruelty, incest or sexual abuse; the distrust generated by theft, lies and deception. A growing number of individuals in the workforce complain because they no longer have pride in their work, they are asked to swindle, lie and cheat in an attempt to make bigger profits. I look at the clockface on the tower of St. John's and am reminded that as the minutes pass the number of people cheating and hurting others has grown. Because of this evil inherent in us, Good Friday had to take place. "He bore the sins of many, and made intercession for the transgressors."

Easter Day is for us a day of celebration because "Christ, our paschal Lamb, has been sacrificed." (I Corinthians 5:7-8) We celebrate not only because Jesus rose victorious from the grave but because he paid the ransom price for our redemption. I close with the words of scripture, Isaiah chapter 53 verses 4-6, from the New International Version:—

"Surely he took up our infirmities and carried our sorrows,

yet we considered him stricken by God, smitten by him, and afflicted.

But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was upon him,

and by his wounds we are healed. We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to his own way; and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all.

"Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!"


mounting in her heart.
