ADVENT

The First Sunday in Advent marks the beginning of the Church's liturgical year. Over four successive Sundays the Church calls its people to prepare themselves to celebrate the birth of Christ by considering the different ways in which God has come, and will yet come, to His world.

We think of those who prepared the way for God's coming in Jesus Christ, particularly John the Baptist, and of Christ's coming at the end of time to consummate God's Kingdom.

Thus, before we hear again the familiar story of God's action in one moment in time and space, we stand back and contemplate the full panorama of God's dealings with His world. The more the Christmas season becomes sentimentalised and trivalised, the greater becomes our need to take this panoramic view.

The Christmas festival, when we come to it, will be likely to be a mere indulgence in shallow sentiment, unless we bring to it a faith nourished by the total Gospel.

JESUS WAS A JEW

During Hitler's mass exterminations, a Jewish boy in a village in Lithuania was herded with other Jews to an open trench to be murdered. He fell into the trench just before the guns were fired. He emerged that night, naked and covered with blood. Shivering and terrified, he wandered through the village under the cover of darkness. He knocked on the door of a house. The person inside, presumably a Christian, opened the door just a crack and told him, "Jew, go back to the grave where you belong." At the door of another house the message was essentially the same: "Jew, go back to the grave.". So he knocked on the door of yet a third house. When the door was opened, he said to the householder, "I am Jesus, and I have come down from the cross." He was invited in, and he survived.

BILL NEWMAN COMING IN 1984

Australian evangelist Bill Newman has been invited by the Evangelical Alliance and the Ministers' Fraternal, to hold a crusade in Launceston in October 1984.

This is to be the largest combined outreach effort in Launceston since the Leighton Ford Crusade in 1977, and the early planning stages have been blessed by a very strong positive response from the churches of Launceston. There is a sense of expectancy that God will do Great things through this ministry.

Bill Newman was born near Lithgow N.S.W. and now lives in Brisbane. He worked as a businessman before being led into Bible College, youth ministry and large scale evangelism. He began his Australian crusades in 1979 in Queensland.

Closer to home, there have been very successful Bill Newman Crusades on the North West Coast in 1981 and in Hobart The Hobart Crusade was particularly blessed in the large number of churches which participated (about 80) and approximately 900 people came forward to start or renew their commitment to Christ.

A local committee has been established to manage the crusade. The chairman is Dr. T.M. Clezy of Evangelical Alliance and other executive members are the Rev. W. A. Humphries (St. Aidan's) and Mr. C. Rodda (Bible Society) vice chairman, Basil Tkaczuk (St. John's) secretary, Mr. T. Williams (St. Aidan's) treasurer and Mr. B. Tattersall (Newstead Baptist) manager.

The clergy of St. John's have expressed strong support for this crusade. Please pray for the whole venture, and ask the Lord in what way you can be involved. Watch out for progress reports over the next few months
