

Palm Sunday

There is in the Gospels a constant tension between the mission of Jesus as he himself understood it and the different categories into which other people were constantly trying to put him and his work. The story of the triumphal entry into Jerusalem, which we relive each Palm Sunday, illustrates that tension very clearly. The crowds welcome Jesus as a national liberator. The action of some in spreading garments in his path recalls what the followers of Jesus did when he was proclaimed king in Israel (2 Kings 9:13). The palm branches (mentioned only by John) recall the welcome given to Simon Maccabaeus when he captured the Jerusalem citadel in 142 B.C. But Jesus chooses to ride into Jerusalem on a donkey, thus deliberately fulfilling the words of Zech. 9: 9-10, a passage which speaks of the cessation of war and or a message of peace to the Gentiles. Jesus will be kind, but on his terms not ours.

Cross & Resurrection

The balanced spiritual life is one which holds in tension the awareness of the Cross and the Resurrection. The Cross and the Resurrection are the two most profound aspects of the Christian experience. When they come together the essence of the Gospel is to be found.

The Cross represents all that is painful, hurting, angry, anguished, distorted and destructive in life. It is there that we are caught up in that which has the potential to destroy us. We find hope at the Cross when we find there One who enters deeply into our situation and who will not leave us alone.

At the Resurrection there is all that is hopeful, joyous, celebrative, positive, creative and victorious. There we find God's fresh springs of new life welling up within us, bubbling over and moving us beyond our own hesitant boundaries.

Seen only from the perspective of the Cross life can be a grim fact of endurance. We suffer with meaning, but without liberation.

From the perspective of the Resurrection life is always triumphant and assertive. It is joyous, but bypasses questions, the grace of helplessnesss, and the acknowledgement of our real condition.

Sometimes we promote Cross-Christianity, encouraging guilt and resignation, preaching rigid morality and uncharitable attitudes. Cross-Christianity aims to bear the weight of life which only Jesus can carry.

If we focus on Resurrection-Christianity all is positive, successful and prosperous. We encourage bigger, brighter, better Christians. This is the "popular" Gospel, which promises a life free of care.

Balanced Christianity seeks to live in the tension between these two extremes. When we know that life moves beyond the Cross we can live with a hope which has no foundation in human endeavour and which, when human endeavour fails, does not leave us to save ourselves.

When we are willing to see the Resurrection as we stand at the Cross we know that resigned suffering is unnecessary. We also know that suffering is not to be dismissed, for it prompts us into asking life's deepest questions. These questions move us from the Cross to the Resurrection, for the One who helps us to form the question will, in His own time, reach back with the answer.

Good Friday must look forward to Easter, and Easter can only be celebrated after Good Friday.

THE RECTOR'S LETTER



My dear friends,

By the time this letter reaches you the election results will probably be known. No matter which political party wins the majority of seats there will still be a sizeable component in our society who are disappointed, frustrated or fearful. Our expectations of politicians is a growing concern. We have virtually come to the stage of forgetting God in our national and public life while asking the human agencies in leadership to be "like gods".

We in Australia are in a time of growing crisis. Our political situtation is far from stable. Talk of social upheavel or revolution is openly debated in many forums. A sizeable component of Australian society is surrounding itself with material riches, security and power, The unemployed and poverty stricken also grow in number, their situation becoming more desperate, their pain and misery in many instances almost unbearable. Add to our social problems the complications of drought and bushfires, the implications of alcohol, drug abuse generally and sickness. No wonder many individuals are depressed and defeated. Even the Church is caught up in this gloom and doom. A fundamental disquiet grows in Tasmania over the "Dams" issue, the divisiveness of the question and the fear generated through media reports that politicians and police are manipulating or circumnavigating the Law. Are we free to protest anymore? Selfishness, greed and lostness are gradually dragging us down and causing disablement.

As individuals and as a Nation we need spiritual revival, a turning back to Jesus, repenting of our sins and a will to be followers of our Lord and His Word. Spiritual revival is not limited to filling

churches, it restores relationships, it heals wounds, it brings peace and purpose, plus the dynamic of hope, because spiritual revival is a renewed and vital relationship of love in Jesus Christ. Through Jesus we are given the love to care and the ability to share

St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians, Chapter Two, is so relevant to our situation. I only quote a number of verses in closing but encourage you to read it all carefully and prayerfully.

"As for you, you are dead in your transgressions and sins, in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air, the spirit who is now at work in those who are disobedient... But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions — it is by grace you have been saved ... For it is by grace you have been saved through faith — and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God — not by works, so that no-one can boast. For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do." (New International Version)

God's grace in Jesus Christ brings us into new life, salvation and forgiveness, but His grace also gives new life so we can be His followers in the closing years of this 20th century.

THE PERFECT CHAPLAIN

A recent survey has compiled all the qualities that military members expect from the perfect chaplain. Here we share some of them with you.

Results of a computerised survey indicate that the perfect chaplain preaches exactly 12 minutes. He frequently condemns sin but never upsets anyone. He works from 0730 until 2400 hours. He is preferably a Captain, makes \$400 a week, wears good clothes, buys good books, drives a good car, and gives about \$500 a week to the poor.

He is 28 years old and has been preaching for 30 years. He is wonderfully gentle and handsome. He gives of himself completely, but never gets close to anyone, lest he be criticised. He speaks boldly on social issues but never becomes politically involved.

He has a burning desire to work with teenagers. He spends all his time with commanders. The perfect chaplain smiles constantly with a straight face, because he has a sense of humour that keeps him seriously dedicated to his work. He makes 15 calls daily on parish families, visits shut-ins and the hospitalised, spends all his time evangelizing the unchurched, is always in his office when needed, and is committed to the ministry of presence.
