

YOUR CHURCH IS YOU

You are a walking advertisement of your church and the Christ whom it proclaims. You take the church out of its four walls, and make it live in the everyday affairs of life. In fact, what people think of your church, they think of you.

Some have the idea that the minister is the church. It is true that the minister often speaks for the church, declares what it stands for, and invites people into its fellowship. It is his job to know the church's buisness and to act on its behalf. He is your representative, but he certainly is not your substitute.

The preaching in the pulpit is fruitless unless it is reflected in the lives of members of the congregation. It is easy to make speeches and claims, but claims must be validated by the product. You are your church's product and the validation of its claims.

Your church professes a concern for people; you express that concern in the way you act towards others. Your church tries to build up a Christian world; you validate these attempts by your conduct on the job or in your community. Your Church claims to have a gospel that will make people new, opening to them a more satisfying life; you are the demonstration of that claim.

Your daily acts as a Christian preach more sermons, teach more people, and save more lives than the words that are spoken inside the four walls of your church building. You are a cell of the living church. Without you, the church has no life.

FAITHFULLY ROOTED

The Acts of the Apostles says that the earliest church was a place of faithfulness. The early believers were a rooted people rooted in the teaching of the apostles, in the community, in the breaking of the bread, and in the prayers.

Being rooted in the apostles' teaching meant taking seriously things like poverty in spirit, becoming like a little child, bearing the daily cross and, most of all, accepting Jesus as the risen Lord.

This rootedness in teaching spilled out into a concern for one another. These people cared whose parent died, whose child was ill, whose job was lost. They were faithful to the community.

And they gave expression to their deeper faith in what they called the breaking of the bread and we call the Eucharist. Nor were they ever far from prayer.

Being the church is today the same — a matter of being faithful, rooted in the teaching, in the community, in the Eucharist, and in the prayer.



Dear friends,

October is Crusade month. Much publicity will be given to Bill Newman and the Crusade tent. Public opinion may at times be divided and some controversial things may be said. Interest will be generated to such a degree that the Crusade should become a common topic of discussion in the Launceston district and beyond. Opportunities for witness and evangelism will be numerous. I hope every Christian, no matter what their personal views about Bill Newman or this method of evangelism - I hope every one of us - will be capitalising on every opportunity to bring Glory to God and to Christ so others may be won to Him.

Criticism and negative comment by Christians will not encourage the enquirer to seek after the new life to be found in Christ alone. Objection and hostility within the churches will not inspire confidence in the searching individual to become part of the Body of Christ. If we in the churches fail to capitalise on this God-given ministry to win people to Jesus Christ, then we deserve the judgment and deadness inflicted.

While we at St. John's have indicated our commitment to the Crusade, and while a number of parishioners are enthusiastic and expectant of the blessing God will pour out, it would be gross exaggeration to state that enthusiasm abounds in the parish. Most parishioners give the impression they want to walk by on the other side and leave the crusading to others. If the impressions are correct, then we as a church are in trouble because our negative attitudes will hammer yet another nail into the coffin of St. John's. We are already a church in crisis. Unless there is a turning to the Lord. a hunger for the life which Jesus alone gives, a deepening love for each other because of the love we have experienced in Jesus, then St. John's will become a cold shell devoid of people who love Jesus and want to share Him with others.


My great fear is that if the churches of Launceston, and our own St. John's in particular, do not grasp hold of the

evangelistic opportunity before us, the warning of Amos, chapter 8, verses 11, 12, which was given to Israel, could come true for us. Under the leading of the Holy Spirit, in humble and prayerful obedience, we have the love of Jesus to share with our neighbours. May the promise of 2 Chronicles, chapter 8, verse 14 come true in our experience.

"If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, THEN WILL I HEAR FROM HEAVEN AND WILL FORGIVE THEIR SIN AND WILL HEAL THEIR LAND," says the Lord.
