Some of you might be wondering how Grahame, my mother's fiancée, is. In the October newsletter I reflected on Grahame's Christian faith and hope in the face of impending death by cancer. Well, a few weeks ago Graham died, and the hospital staff witnessed his pastors and fiancée standing around his death bed singing his favourite hymns with tears and hope and grief and faith. Grahame was a soldier of the Salvation Army and, more importantly, a soldier in Christ's army (2 Timothy 2:3-4). I say 'was' because the fight and struggle against sin, the world and the devil are now over for Grahame (2 Tim 4:6-7). He has been promoted from the trenches on the front line to HQ in glory. With all deceased believers from every age, he is now safely with the King of Kings (Philippians 1:20-23; 2 Tim 4:7-8; Revelation 6:9-11).

Remarkably, this King came down onto the front line at the first Christmas (Revelation 12:1-4), and, during his final years, fought against the Enemy and finally defeated him by death on a cross (Colossians 2:15; cf. Revelation 12:7-10). With our sins punished in our substitute, King Jesus (John 10:11, 14-17; Romans 3:23-26; 1 Peter 2:24-25), and with sin's tyranny over us broken (John 8:34-36; Romans 6), Satan's power over God's people has been smashed and they have been freed not only from slavery to sin but also from the slavery of the fear of death and judgment (Hebrews 2:14-17; 1 John 4:18). The proof of this is the Father's vindication of his Son in resurrection from death (Rom 1:3-4; 4:24-25; Phil 2:8-9). Jesus' resurrection -exaltation was also the occasion for his 'promotion' to the divine glory that he knew before but had left behind (John 17:1-5), and to an authority and Lordship over all things that he didn't know before (Matthew 28:16-18; Phil 2:9-10; Acts 17:30-31).

The cross and empty tomb of Jesus cast a long shadow back over his manger in Bethlehem and forward over his people in every age and place. The cross and empty tomb define and drive our lives on earth and determine our destiny in glory. Is this how you see things? Is this how you see your life and future? This is how God sees it for all of his people. When you understand and believe it you will live a life of quiet hope and joy and faithful service in the face of disease, difficulties and death.

How different that is to the life of the unbeliever, typified by a writer in his 80s I heard interviewed by arch-atheist Philip Adams on the radio this year. This celebrated author nearing the end of his life believes, I quote, 'we're put on this earth to fart around.' If we're honest, that basically describes pretty well most people we know, including some believers!

If it describes you and your life, what don't you understand and/or believe about the gospel? Tell God. Tell a trusted Christian. Seek help. Determine to quit 'farting around' with things of little consequence. With the help of the Holy Spirit and God's people, strive to be a 'good soldier of Christ Jesus' (2 Tim 2:3), living a life that will echo into eternity to the glory of God. It would be a good idea to carefully read the Bible references given above. Moreover, if you are not already in one of our parish's home groups, do yourself and your church a favour and join one. These are places where you will grow in your knowledge and love of God and where you will be ministered to and have a ministry. Ask your local Ministry Team about the groups in your area.

Did you know that Riverlinks marked its third anniversary on 22nd November? In view of this and the coming of Christmas, let me restate what our church exists for:

To prepare people for eternity, by living and proclaiming God's gospel, to the glory of God. That's it. We exist to love and evangelise the lost - our mission - and to love and edify the found - our ministry. And did you know that each centre in Riverlinks has its own Action Plan to fulfil that God-given mission and ministry? They were published in the 2007 Annual Report and launched and prayed for during the Annual Meeting. If not already, I urge you to speak with your local Ministry Support Team about the Action Plan and how you might plug into it. There are a lot of lost people to reach and a fair few believers to build up and encourage.

On a related topic, the Calling Out for new MST members in August has resulted in two possible new Team members (I say 'possible' because they are still discerning God's will in this, which includes a meeting with diocesan vocational advisors next month) and two Team members who are exploring the possibility of becoming Locally Ordained Ministers in the parish.

At the same time, the Team and parish are losing Nathan Donnelly who is moving to WA next month to take up a teaching position there, Ian Booth went off the Team at the end of 2006, and with the approval of the MST/PC and Bishop, Kelvin Todd has gone off the Team but continues to function as a LOM. There will be an opportunity to thank God for Nathan, Ian and Kelvin's ministry on the MST in forthcoming services at both St Aidan's and St Mary Magdalene's. We had hoped to grow the three local Teams to six, but this won't happen at this time for two of our three Teams. All of this only serves to heighten the importance of everyone stepping up and doing the ministry and mission that must be done and should be done and that God has gifted and shaped them for. Moreover, your Ministry Support Team members will be greatly encouraged and helped. I believe the St Aidan's congregation is still one person short of adequate representation on Parish Council. Could this be an opportunity for you to serve God's people and Kingdom? If you think it might, please speak with your local MST.

I want to take this opportunity to recognise those seven people who are currently enrolled in Moore Theological College's Preliminary Theological Certificate - Kaye Gregory, Dick Janes, Peter Cox, Trish Anderson, Olive-Berrie Gunst, Jo Tevelein and Alister Stott. Their motivation is to grow in their knowledge and love of God through the study of his Word and in their capacity to serve his people. I encourage you to encourage them in their studies by taking an interest in what they are learning and in praying for them. In November four of them even elected to sit the exam for their subject. You'll be able to pick who they are by their anxious wait for their results!

So as to assist our theological students, MST members, preachers, and home group leaders, the parish has built up its theological library in the parish office. There are excellent book, CD and DVD resources available for loan (for any parishioner), including two complete sets of Bible commentaries, Introductions to the Old and New Testament, and a Bible Dictionary.



Finally, with you, I want to wish Nathan Donnelly well in his new life as a teacher from next year. Nathan will be teaching a grade 4 to 7 composite class with about 15 to 18 indigenous students, at Birlirr Ngawiyiwu Catholic School in a town called Yaruman, which is 160km south east of Halls Creek in WA. Do you think he could get any further away from us! I know Nathan will value our prayers as he prepares for this big step. It has been terrific having Nathan's energy and ideas and youth focus over these past three years and he will certainly be missed in the George Town congregation, his local MST and the wider Team. Nathan's last service in George Town will be on Sunday 16th December, at which he will be farewelled and prayed for.

Along with Christmas, I look forward to seeing more people 'step up to the plate' for the ministry and mission of our church, to hearing of more people joining home groups, more people growing in their understanding of God and his eternal purposes, more people in our communities touched by the love of God and hearing his gospel, more people in the eternal Kingdom preparing for eternity as 'good soldiers of Christ Jesus.'

PEACE ON EARTH, AND IN THE CHURCH

'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men on whom his favour rests,' sang the angels (Luke 2:14). A mangled version of this has entered popular speech, making Christmas a time to think about the end of wars on the earth. Not that that is a bad hope, and as we end 2007, it is certainly right for us to look out into the world and long for a thorough outbreak of peace among all men everywhere.

But the peace which the angels announced was an even more profound one. It was peace between God and humanity, a reconciliation through Christ the Lord. Much as we long for the cessation of war, so much more should we be gladdened that God has acted to remove the causes of warfare between himself and us. This is what makes us sing with joy at Christmas and throughout the year. It is also the true ground of reconciliation between people.

Unfortunately, even God's people, saints who are also sinners, fall into the trap of quarrelling with each other. The peace which should rule our relationships does not always have that effect. Christmas offers us a reminder that we should attend to our fellowship with each other and yearn for wholesome and healthy relationships based on truth and love.

Some disagreements amongst God's people involve matters of principle where we have to differ. We need to do so courteously wherever possible. But truth is even more important than unity, and the consequences of unbiblical teaching have to be revealed and opposed.

This is a rather unsettling matter to be talking about at Christmas. It is not the fact of having doctrinal disagreements which is wrong. We can, however, conduct ourselves wrongly in an otherwise good cause. We must always endeavour to 'speak the truth in love'. Then, despite our disagreements and the necessary actions we must take to help people and to teach God's word, we may do so in a way which brings that glory to God which was the first element of the angels' song.

About 10 people stayed at Bell Buoy Beach and endured 40 hours of eating nothing but barley sugar and drinking fruit juice, water, and tea. Two members had to work at the local IGA which made their experience that little bit harder as they served hot food and chocolate to customers.

Participants were involved in a reflection walk, games and a movie night which ended with a prayer time. There was no shortage of bible studies in fact 6 studies that focused on faith being an action, not just words.

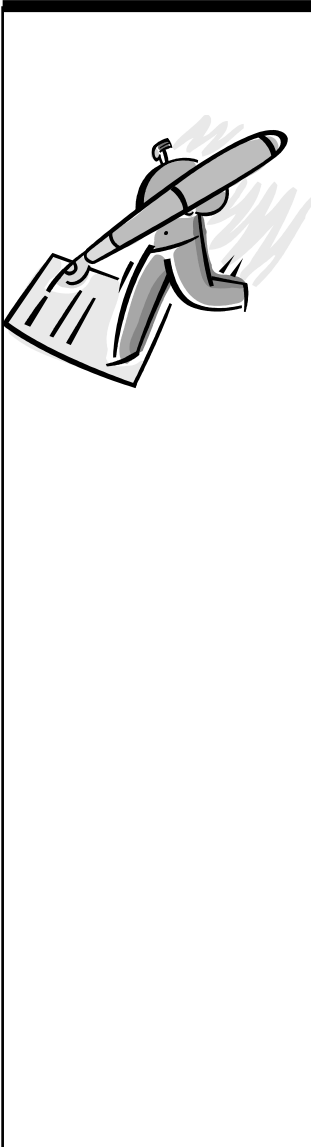
A new catch cry was formed by the group which encompassed what all the studies were on "Living faith is doing good stuff".

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD END OF YEAR REPORT

Well what a year it's been. I have been extremely busy speaking and sharing with many different people from all walks of life about Operation Christmas Child.

I had prayed and set a target of 3,000 boxes from the Launceston/Tamar Valley area and as the boxes started rolling in during collection time, I was seriously doubting that I would reach my target, as we had only received 1300 boxes to date. That was the beginning of my downward spiral. A certain amount of pride in what I could do had crept in and God gently reminded me that it was not all about me and my Achievements. I cried out for forgiveness and told the Lord that He was right, and I would be happy with what He would bring in during the last week of collection. As I sat down on Sunday night to do my bible study, the words of Ephesians 3:20,21 jumped out at me.

Needless to say that I went to bed that night with great, yet still wondering, expectation of what would unfold in the next 3 days. I organised extra helpers in anticipation, and God did not let me down. When I think back to those amazing 3 days I'm reduced to tears, as hundreds upon hundreds of boxes poured in, and YES, THE LORD'S total and mine was reached. To date the total is 3080 boxes. There is nothing our God cannot do and all glory belongs to Him.

The part that the Riverlinks community played in this total was also nothing short of amazing. Our combined total of boxes was 196, a huge effort well exceeding last year. No matter what contribution you made, whether it was putting boxes together or buying items to go in, donating money to help send the boxes over to Cambodia, helping me out at the collection centre, or being part of my prayer team please accept my sincere thanks, and for being part of God's team as we reach out to desperately poor children of the world with His love and hope.

On 14th January I will be traveling to Vietnam. Although I will not be giving out Tasmanian boxes, I will see the delight joy and laughter that these boxes bring. Please pray for me that I will display, in everything I do and say, the love of Jesus, and that lives will be transformed.

I look forward to working and sharing with you all next year. Who knows what we can achieve when we commit everything to God.
