**From The Old Testament book - Nehemiah
From chapters 7 & 8**

Quote

No revival or reformation is long secure or long fruit bearing without a major focus on the Word of God; otherwise our faith becomes merely emotional, and skewed and silly.

Observation

The peoples' corporate worship, tearful confession, joy and mutual service were

a response to hearing and understanding the Word of God.

Question

Do you come to church and home group EXPECTING to hear God speak to his people through his Word? Do you pray for the reading and teaching and learning of the Bible in church?; and for real UNDERSTANDING of God's words leading to repentance and faith and obedience?

Talk 3 on Nehemiah 9 & 10 by Don Carson

Quote

In their great prayer of confession, the people of God aren't merely confessing individual sins and lusts, but their previous and current corporate sin and rebellion.

Question

What blessing might flow to our congregations when they corporately confess their sins – for eg., lukewarm love for Jesus and his people, divisiveness and divisions, disobedience or indifference to the Word of God, inaction on mission and service to their community?

The Scriptures are the glasses by which we bring the world into focus. When we look through the glasses of Scripture, we see God and his world and his people and ourselves more clearly. There are some things, especially about God, that we would never see at all without the Scriptures. Is it possible your congregation has on the whole lost sight of either or both of the glory or mission of God? How will you correct this?

Mission exists because worship doesn't.

In our Western churches much Christianity is an inch deep...Biblical illiteracy and shallow discipleship abound.

Questions

How deep is your discipleship? Your congregation's maturity?

How can the book of Nehemiah help you here? See the above on Nehemiah. Do you need one-on-one discipling or are you able to take on discipling others one-on-one?

Quotes

Mission is at the core of God and therefore of discipleship.

Questions:

What part of your centre's strategic plan will you get involved with in order to help your church partner with God in his Mission?

Birgit has been running the project in Monkey Bay since 2002, so that makes this the fifth season that she has come 'home' to live and work as a nurse to make enough money for her budget to return to Monkey Bay in February and work with and for the Malawian people.

Birgit works here for her budget but all your donations go straight to the children and to the building projects to support them. There is no 'middle man' or business chain to absorb funds.

There are several ways people can help Birgit in her work for the African people of Malawi:

1. Encourage Sponsors to provide secondary school fees of \$160 for one year – includes fees, exam fees, books, school bag, math instruments, writing materials, uniform, textbooks, Bible.
2. Encourage Supporters to help finance the project – building a hostel for students who would otherwise travel for 3 hr to school on foot. A Community Hall was build last year with a library, an office, a place to study after school
3. Send a parcel of books for the library – encyclopedia /teaching books on any topics/interesting novels to develop reading and knowledge of the world.
4. Encourage Volunteers to join the Monkey Bay Project for 2 weeks up to 3 months. Skilled or unskilled are all welcome and will make a difference.
5. Form a small group and do some fundraising for this year for water pipes, tanks and to establish a vegetable garden and tree planting.

PAKISTANI PASTOR MURDERED IN NORTH WEST FRONTIER PROVINCE: PART OF A PATTERN OF ANTI-CHRISTIAN THREATS AND VIOLENCE:

Threatened by murder, kidnapping and intimidation, Christians are coming under pressure both from lawlessness and from Islamic radicalism in Pakistan`s North West Frontier Province which borders Afghanistan. Most recently, on January 17th a church minister, Sajid William, was shot dead in Peshawar, the capital city of the province.

Over recent years the North West Frontier Province has steadily become a hotbed of Islamic radicalism. The strength of Islamic radicalism throughout Pakistan was recently indicated by the assassination of Benazir Bhutto. As well as the murder of Sajid William, there have been many recent attacks on the North West Frontier Province`s Christians. There have been several cases in recent months of Christians being kidnapped in the province, often by militants or criminals linked to Taliban, who demand ransoms or the release of militants held in Pakistani jails. Christian schools have suffered bomb attacks for failing to adhere to Islamic values. The continuing persecution of Christians in the province was shown by the series of threats made against Christians in 2007 to convert to Islam or be killed.

The North West Frontier Province is home to a tiny Christian minority comprising just 0.25% of the province`s population. (This compares with a Christian population of around 2.5% in Pakistan as a whole.) The increasing power of the Taliban in the region and the failure of central government to control the area have meant that Christians are becoming exposed to increasing danger. In 2003 provincial legislators unanimously passed a bill giving shari`a (Islamic law) precedence over secular provincial law. Militants have also enforced an unofficial parallel justice system based on extreme versions of shari`a. This has placed great pressure on minorities.

Christians blamed for acts of radical criminal gangs

The situation for Christians is increasingly difficult throughout all of Pakistan. A Barnabas contact in the Punjab region, which borders India, recently explained that in one village criminal gangs, linked to the Islamist radical group Lashkar-i-Taiba, have been trying to pass the blame for their crimes on to Christians.

The police have colluded with the criminals in blaming the Christians for crimes they did not commit. Christians, therefore, feel very vulnerable as the authorities are not willing to protect them.

Meanwhile, in Pakistan the growing threat to Christians was highlighted by the recent killing of the elder brother of Younis Tasadaq in January. Younis Tasadaq had been accused under the "blasphemy law" in 1998, but was released and managed to escape to America in 1999. In 2007 he returned to Pakistan, and it is believed that Islamic radicals discovered he was back in the country and assassinated his brother, Simon, whom they mistook for Younis. So far police have refused to register the case, claiming it was suicide.

Dr Patrick Sookhdeo, International Director of Barnabas Fund, comments: "Christian minorities in Pakistan need our prayers, especially the beleaguered Christians of the North West Frontier Province, who face the pressure of shari`a as well as the violence of Islamic militants. I am thankful to the Lord for their faithfulness and courage in the face of such sustained pressure."

1. Pray for the grieving families of Sajid William and Simon Tasadaq and for all who knew them.
2. Pray for courage and hope for Pakistani Christians, many of whom have received death threats.
