FROM THE ENABLER

How are you finding our Lenten preaching series:

'Jesus in all the 'Scriptures?' One of the main reasons for doing it is to help all of us in Riverlinks be more able and more enthusiastic Bible readers. Before this preaching series if you were asked what the Bible is all about, I wonder how you would have answered? It is a very exciting and significant discovery to find that the whole Bible - Old and New Testaments - speaks with ONE voice about God reconciling his people to Himself in his Son. This is the way Jesus himself understood the Old Testament Scriptures (Luke 24:25-27, 44-47; John 5:39-47) - as being about HIM and his Kingdom and Salvation; and of course, the New Testament is the authoritative witness to his person and his work on our behalf, and the authoritative pattern for life together as disciples of the Lord Jesus.

At a recent Riverlinks preaching workshop I told the preachers and prospective preachers there that it's possible to so read and preach on a biblical passage that it isn't a CHRISTIAN interpretation and sermon; that it would be perfectly acceptable in a Jewish synagogue.

So, wherever we are in the Bible, we need to ask the question, 'Where is this in the course of God's salvation history? Is it Old or New Covenant?' If Old, ask, 'How does this passage help explain or enrich our understanding of Christ and his salvation?' Try it for yourself. Read the passage preached on in Riverlinks on Sunday 24th February - Exodus 12 - with that question in mind. Then ask, 'How does the New Testament interpret this event?' That way you will have read Exodus 12 Christianly, and you will have a deeper understanding of and appreciation for God's provision of his Son as a sacrifice in our place to spare us from the coming wrath (see John 1:29, 35-36; Rom 3:21-26; 1 Thessalonians 1:9-10; Rev 5:1-10). If we are reading the New Testament ask, 'What does this passage teach me about Jesus and his Kingdom and Salvation?' 'How does the Old Testament and the provisions and patterns of the Old Covenant help me understand what this NT passage is saying about Jesus and his salvation?' Try it for yourself. After you have read and thought about Exodus 12, read Revelation 5:1-10 with that question in mind.

The eunuch was reading this passage of Scripture:

"He was led like a sheep to the slaughter, and as a lamb before the shearer is silent, so he did not open his mouth.

When you discover that the Bible isn't a random collection of unrelated stories but ONE progressively unfolding story about God's Salvation in Christ - keenly anticipated in the Old Testament and wonderfully fulfilled in the New, you read it with new eyes and understanding and enthusiasm; moreover, when the JWs and Mormons come knocking with their shrinkwrapped and pre-digested teachings based on biblical proof texts out of context, you won't be fooled into thinking that the Bible is all about knowing God as 'Jehovah' or their cult's narrow focus on their own movement and prophecies and writings. Instead, you will know that the Bible is all about God's gracious initiative in revealing himself and reconciling sinners to himself in and through his Son, Jesus; and God willing, you'll have the confidence to tell them that!

So, may you be reading your Bible more diligently than you do the Examiner and TV Guide! And may you read it as Jesus read it - as being all about HIM. And may you speak the truth about Jesus to one another in love, 'Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of men in their deceitful scheming' (Eph 4:14).

In & Through the Parish

In last month's parish newsletter I told you about those MST members who successfully passed their first *Preliminary Theological Certificate* subject. I realized that I also should have recognized the other members of MST and our parish family who are also doing this study - Peter Cox, Jenny Pedley, Dick Janes, Olive-Berrie Gunst, and as I write I think Kelvin and Libby Todd are enrolling in the first unit. I am delighted that so many of us are applying ourselves to serious study of the Bible and theology, in order to be more equipped for the Christian life and for ministry. I am also delighted that the MST and Parish Council recently approved a pathway to Authorised Lay Ministry in the parish that includes enrolment in the *Preliminary Theological Certificate* for future authorised Preachers in the parish.

our having two full time workers among us - Anne Godman and me - in addition to our diocesan and mission commitments, and in light of Parish Council's goal for the parish to support this level of commitment without outside help.

By now you will have hopefully heard about the visit to the state of the Sydney-based children's ministry team - Quizworx. Riverlinks is organising their visit to the north of the state and BayWest parish the south. Lisa Chugg at St Aidan's is working very hard on developing an itinerary for Quizworx for ministry in primary schools for the week Monday 14th to Friday 18th April. She would very much appreciate your prayers as she speaks with schools and their chaplains and principals. Quizworx have cutting-edge shows in which they present the Christian message in a fun and engaging 30 minutes with puppets and stories and audience participation.

As part of this week of ministry to children, Riverlinks is holding our inaugural Children's Ministry Training Day on the Saturday 19th April. Lisa Chugg has had some help from a friend at The Branch Christian Church in Kings Meadows, and they have kindly offered their excellent facilities as the venue for the training day, as well as doing the catering for a very modest fee! I am delighted with the program that we have put together for the day, and of course Quizworx features heavily. There are keynote addresses and elective workshops on different aspects of ministry to children and on ministry to and in our local schools. Are you interested in going? Taking someone? Promotional/registration brochures are available across the parish. Our Parish Administrator, Anne Godman, produced them and they look great! Helen Phillips (Safe Ministry, Family and Children's Ministry Development Officer for the Diocese) has emailed the brochure to all the parishes in the Diocese with her enthusiastic endorsement! I have had a copy sent to the leaders of all the Christian churches in Launceston. I am hoping this is something we will run at least every two years. Did you know that the majority of Christians come to faith in Christ AS CHILDREN OR YOUNG PEOPLE?

Of course we have to share in paying for **Quizworx'** travel expenses for three team members from Sydney to Launceston, and their fee for their week in our schools, their involvement in the training day, and also for their ministry to us at our next combined parish service at St Aidan's on Sunday 20th April, when the Bishop will be with us for Confirmations. The total will be approximately \$3,000.



Children's Ministry

Training Day Saturday 19th April 2008

The day is for anyone who has or plan to have ministries to children, wherever those ministries may be - at church, in after school or holiday kid's clubs, CRE and SUPA Clubs in primary schools etc.

Registration brochures are now available in all centres, or directly form the parish office. We are hopeful that the net income from the training day will be around \$1,250 (based on an estimate of 50 participants). Also, our friends at The Branch Church have offered to hold a fundraising evening. It is conceivable that we will still need to find around \$1,000. I would also like to give the other presenters at the training day a modest gift for their contribution.

Are you able to make a contribution to this or run a fundraising activity for it? Here's what I plan to do to raise some money: Later in March I plan to have my hairdresser shave all my hair off, with the hope that the members of our Riverlinks church family will give money in return. You can give it to me when you see my bald head in your centre on a Sunday, or you can give it to your local Ministry Support Team to pass on. It's not tax deductible, but hair deductible! And here's another challenge: that one person from each of the three centres in the parish does the same!! Go on. It's not Winter, and I can almost guarantee a photo of the four of us will end up in the Tasmanian Anglican. I look forward to receiving your gifts or your hair!!

They have been going for ten years now, and God has grown their team and ministry considerably. They go into schools right across Australia, as well as do training in children's ministry, and are developing resources for children's ministry: DVDs, CDs, Gospel comics, story books, Holiday Kid's Mission packs, etc. They have exciting plans for the future. Also, during their week with us they are keen to go to our parish's home groups so as to be able to share about their ministry. If your home group would like Quizworx to visit of an evening between Monday 14th and Friday 18th April, please let me or a MST member know.

Finally, on a personal level, Julie, Gabbie, Jordan and I have recently decided to make St Aidan's East Launceston our family's church. Julie plans to assist with teaching the congregation new songs, and to help Christina Booth run a new Sunday morning ministry to children and youth.

I believe God is doing terrific things in and through Riverlinks and that the best is yet to come. Be assured of my prayers for your congregation and its leadership. I would also value your prayers for me and my ministry in the parish and diocese.

A PLEA FOR INCLUSIVE LANGUAGE FOR AN INCLUSIVE COMMUNITY

Imagine that some of your non-church friends have finally reached the point where they feel ready to accept your invitation to come and check out what happens in church on a Sunday morning. Are we, as a Christian community, ready to be inclusive?

In our use of language, do we, unconsciously, appear to exclude large numbers of people from our midst?

- However much some may scoff at notions of 'political correctness', do we, as a church, want to use language that appears to exclude people on the basis of, for example, their gender?
- Are women fully included in our church as women, or are women regarded as invisible 'honorary men' [as in, 'when it says "men" of course it really means you ladies as well'!]

Inclusive language is not a matter of 'political correctness': it is a matter of being genuinely inclusive.

- Inclusive language is language that does not appear to exclude any one group of people by its use of specific and seemingly exclusive terms where a more inclusive equivalent is available and appropriate.
- Inclusive language is the commonly used language in schools & universities, and in all branches of the public service, and has been for at least the last 20 years.
- For anyone under 40, and anyone working in any of these mainstream occupations, it is simply normal language.

Are women included as full members of our church, in the language of:

- our songs and hymns?
- our prayers and liturgy?
- our bible readings and preaching?
- our normal speech?

If you are not sure that this is a problem, try substituting the words:

- 'sisters' for brothers
- 'women' for men
- 'daughters' for sons

and so on, in some of your favourite songs, prayers or scriptures.

In their fright the women bowed down with their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead?

risen!



If you are male, and feel that these substitutions leave you entirely out of the picture, you now know how many women feel!

The most recent version of the Anglican prayer-book uses inclusive language. Most worship songs and hymns can be rephrased to be inclusive in their language. There are several versions of the bible which use inclusive language, including the New Revised Standard Version [NRSV] and Today's New International Version [TNIV].

Please think about this in preparing for worship. Whether you are leading worship, choosing the songs, reading from the scriptures, preaching, leading the community in prayer, or even giving out a notice, try and remember to be inclusive in your language.

Remember, you need 'willing cooks' to cater, not necessarily 'ladies'; you need 'fit people' to shift furniture, not necessarily men!

Finally, if your church is considering the purchase of new bibles, as well as considering the style of expression that will best fit the demographics of your particular community [about which our enabler can give advice], please think about choosing a version that does not, by its language, seem to unnecessarily exclude more than 50% of the church community!

PS: this is not all about being 'modern': the old-fashioned term 'brethren' was inclusive of both men and women, brothers and sisters: 'brothers' alone is not really an adequate substitute!

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TIME AND PLACE

Over the last few days I have been thinking about two seemingly different things. The first is: how was it possible for Adolf Hitler to enlist so many to his wicked plans through the Nuremberg rallies? The second is a conversation I was part of involving evangelists John Chapman and Claire Boyd - someone who loves doing "walk up evangelism". Walk up evangelism is where you engage complete strangers in a gospel conversation. John was shocked when Claire said that over a third of those she approached were happy to talk about Jesus. In his years of experience he guessed the figure was well below 10%.

The thought that links the two topics is that there are some circumstances that make our efforts conducive to success and some that do not. If Hitler had spoken at a different time in history, in a different setting to a different size crowd with different recent events in their minds, he would have had a very different outcome. Could it be that success in getting into gospel conversations might not be merely dependent on the person evangelising or the style they adopt, but also on other factors? Why does walk up evangelism work well in one place and not in another?

Here are some random thoughts I have had on the matter:

1. Wrong place

I was told about a church that has a stall in a shopping centre from which they distribute tracts. The same person tends the stall each week. The stall relocated to another shopping centre, and the same shoppers used both centres. At the first centre no one came up to the stall, but they had great success at the second centre. I am not sure what the reason for this is. It could be anything: visibility, the store they are in front of, whether shoppers take more time to browse at the second centre. Whatever the reason, a lesson is that sometimes failure in evangelism can simply come down to being in the wrong place when we seek to share Christ.

2. Wrong time

I know from personal failure that if you want to engage in "walk up evangelism" you must do it where people have nothing better to do with their time. If they are working to a timetable or in a rush no one will stop and talk to you. People whiling away their time over lunch, or bored waiting for someone are good options for getting a conversation going. The most productive opportunities I have had were with those university students who went to the talking room in the library to study but were secretly hoping to be interrupted. They were always happy to talk. I wonder whether long distance train trips would work for the same reason.

3. Wrong numbers

Sometimes people will talk when they enjoy the safety of being in the majority but usually the fewer the better. Beware the perils of attempting to engage a group - all it takes is one disinterested person in a group to stop all conversation. Likewise, there is a gender issue as well. Women are less likely to speak in a mixed group.

4. Wrong expectations

We all have expectations of what will happen when we do something. The same is true for conversations we start up. If those expectations are not met or things turn out contrary to our hopes we often try to manipulate the flow of things so that they conform more to what we wanted to achieve - and this can have the unfortunate effect of digging an even deeper hole.



With expectations, we need to be flexible and adaptable in the situation, and also have the willingness to close something down if it is not working.

5. Momentum

I notice that one of the big words in the current US Presidential races is momentum. If a candidate has a series of wins, it is called momentum and often leads to even more wins. That is often the case in our evangelistic efforts. Momentum keeps the evangeliser going, and somehow seems to bring more people willing to listen.

So what is the bottom line in all this?

Simply, don't despair if your evangelistic efforts seem to fail. It is easy to blame ourselves but it is not necessarily you or your method. It is good to think about what factors may have humanly contributed to success or failure and learn from that for the future.

And most important of all: **don't give up**. The next conversation may be the one God has prepared someone to heed.
