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But do not forget this one thing, dear friends: With the Lord a day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like a day. The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. He is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance.

FROM THE ENABLER

I want to help you to think biblically and so rightly about the ecological and human disasters that are



so prominent in our newscasts and, I hope, in our minds and prayers, at this time. I do not for a minute claim to have the issue of human pain and suffering neatly worked out like some mathematical formula; but some things CAN and MUST be said, because they are affirmed by the Word of God and even confirmed by our own experiences, and these things speak with great force and urgency to our human condition and situation.

First, I'll outline what *can* be said from the Bible, before then speaking more generally about suffering and its place in the world:

1. The Bible establishes a **general connection** between human sin and suffering – Gen 3; Rom 8:20-22; 2 Pet 3; Revelation.

This is a vital part of the biblical worldview: that because of our first parents' rebellion against God (that we all share in by heredity and actuality), our race lives outside of Eden (Gen 3:22-24), in a world that God has cursed (Gen 3:17-19) and subjected to futility and bondage to decay (Rom 8:19-21), and that, like God, is against us. We are fallen and flawed, our world is now fallen and flawed. The devastating dislocation seen in a major earthquake is not only demonstration of this, but it is also symbolic of the devastating dislocation in all our significant relationships – with God, each other, and the natural world. Human rebellion has set the natural world, the human world, and God against us (Gen 3:16-19; Rom 3:9-20). When was the last time you heard Psalm 90 (instead of Psalm 23!) read at a funeral?

'You return man to dust and say, "Return, O children of man!"...

You sweep them away as with a flood...

For we are brought to an end by your anger; by your wrath we are dismayed.

You have set our iniquities before you, our secret sins in the light of your presence. For all our days pass away under your wrath...' (vv.3,5,7-9; cf. Rom 1:18ff.; Eph 2:3).

But the day of the Lord will come like a thief. The heavens will disappear with a roar; the elements will be destroyed by fire, and the earth and everything in it will be laid bare.

1 Peter 3: 8-10 THIS is the reality of human existence, and it explains so much, doesn't it?

Notice in Revelation 6 the glorified Jesus sovereignly oversees and directs world history (v.1; cf. 5:1-14), and notice the power to inflict suffering on the earth is 'given' to the riders (6:2,4,6,8) and they are summoned by the living creatures around God's throne. The obvious implication is that all this suffering that is common to every age is ultimately under God's control. One of the main messages of Revelation is that God and the Lamb are in control of everything.

An important corollary of this first point is that not all suffering is directly related to specific sins and we can only ever know when it is when God tells us. But we must accept the general connection between human sin and suffering, and at the very least affirm that God is nonetheless 'behind' suffering. As we've seen, he has 'built it into' our world and existence, and Revelation 6 and the whole of the Bible insists that God is sovereign over his world and its suffering. NOTHING happens without his knowledge and permission.

2. Sometimes <u>specific suffering</u> is directly related to <u>specific</u> <u>sin</u> and **we know it because God has told us.**

For example, The Flood (Gen 6-8; 2 Pet 3:1-6); Israel's occupation of Canaan as God's judgment on the idolatrous nations they drove out (Deut 7); the destruction of Jerusalem/exile of the Jews (Deut 28:15-68; the prophets); a Jewish man's 38-year paralysis which Jesus healed (John 5:14); the sicknesses and deaths of some loveless Corinthian Christians (1 Cor 11:27-34); the cross of Jesus being the place and occasion of God's judgment on his sinful people in their divine substitute, Jesus (Rom 3:21-26; 1 Pet 2:21-25; 3:18); the Final Judgment (Matt 7:24-27; 11:20-24; 2 Thess 1:5-12; 2 Pet 3:1-13; Rev 6:12-17; 20:11-15).

3. Some suffering is not directly related to specific sin – cf. Job; John 9:1-3; 11:4,14-16,45.

What else can we say? Jesus warned of wars, famines and earthquakes in various places as 'but the beginning of the birth pains' (Matt 24:6-8). Manmade and 'natural' disasters are the inevitable pains before the end and tell us we are heading towards the Second Coming.

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Don't be naive. There are difficult times ahead. As the end approaches, people are going to be self-absorbed, money-hungry, self-promoting, stuck-up, profane, contemptuous of parents, crude, coarse, dog-eat-dog, unbending, slanderers. impulsively wild, savage, cynical,

Moreover, human suffering and disasters warn us of a greater disaster to come – **Final Judgment.**

In Luke 12:54-56, we hear Jesus' criticism of the Jews for their ability to accurately read the weather while failing to read the signs of the times – salvation and judgment, both now (v.56) and at the End (vv.57-59; 13:3,5).

This prompts some of his hearers to tell him about a massacre that had occurred in Jerusalem; presumably they thought they were 'reading the times' correctly, deducing that the victims were particularly sinful. Jesus replies by also remembering an accident involving a collapsing tower, insists that these victims hadn't been especially singled out by God, though they weren't 'innocent' either, AND concludes from each incident that such things should warn us all that unless we repent, we will perish; that is, in the Judgment to come. Therefore, disasters and suffering remind us of our rebellion against God and of the coming Judgment and therefore of the urgent need to repent.

In his wonderful little book on the subject, 'The Problem of Pain,' C. S. Lewis writes, 'But pain insists on being attended to. God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pain: it is His megaphone to rouse a deaf world' (p.74).

Of course, this warning of Judgment is for God's people to continue to heed as well. If we withdraw from the Lord Jesus and his people (Heb 6:1-8; 10:19-25) or 'go on sinning deliberately after receiving the knowledge of the truth' (Heb 10:26), 'there no longer remains a sacrifice for sins, but a fearful expectation of judgment, and a fury of fire that will consume the adversaries...It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God' (Heb 10:26b-27,31).

So, the wars and famines and earthquakes and disasters that afflict us should function as <u>reality checks</u> (especially for us comfortable Westerners living in our unreal cyber and TV worlds), and as <u>grave warnings</u> of a much greater calamity and loss – the Judgment of our thrice-holy Creator God; so truly awful that the Lord Jesus likened it to 'unquenchable fire' (Mk 9:44) and gave himself up as a sacrifice in order to spare his

people from it (Rev 7:9-17)!!! So truly awful that those who haven't repented and found refuge in Jesus and his cross, will call on the mountains and rocks to fall on them and hide them 'from the face of him who is seated on the throne, and from the wrath of the Lamb, for the great day of their wrath has come, and who can stand' (Rev 6:16-17)?

In the face of disasters of the scale we are seeing unfold in Burma and China, and in the face of such dire warnings that they, the cross, and the Scripture sound, you and I ought to be reduced to astonishment and awe at the holiness and mercy, the salvation and judgment, of the true and living God. 'There but for the grace of God go I.' Brothers and sisters in Christ, allow both the grace of God and the judgment of God to keep driving you and your congregations to deep humility, true repentance, obedience, thankfulness, prayerfulness, and mission to a world that is in pain and sin.

Exciting Feedback on the Quizworx visit

Thanks to the many of you who kindly gave a donation towards the cost of bringing QW to Tassie in April. It was an excellent investment. I am so thankful for the week of ministry we had with them. Matt, Danny and Chris (and their puppets) performed in 16 schools in the north and north west, sharing the gospel of God's grace through Jesus with approximately 3,000 infants/primary-aged children!!! The kids loved them and principals and teachers have spoken very highly of them, both to us in person and on feedback letters we subsequently sent them. Quizworx featured heavily in our parish's first children's ministry training day, which was an excellent day. 35 people attended from numerous churches including from the new Anglican church at Somerset, and in person and on the evaluation sheets spoke very highly of the day, indicating that they'd like to have this training day every two years. QW have said they'd be very happy to return and do it all again in 2010. I must acknowledge the huge part Lisa Chugg (and Martin in support) played in coordinating the schools program. Lisa encountered many obstacles, but persevered and trusted God for the outcome and it exceeded our expectations. Mike Le Rossignol's wise advice on dealing with the schools was invaluable. Friends from the Branch Church in Kings Meadows were also very helpful and generous with helping organise the week and raise money for it; not to mention providing their excellent facility for the training day (free of charge), and catering for it!



We were all encouraged by the stand taken by these young adults as they publicly declared their faith and are confident this will be remembered by them as a special event in their lives. An exciting and lively presentation for the children by Quizworx, a visiting Christian puppet theatre company, was another highlight, together with Bishop John's sermon.

No sooner had people cleared the building after morning tea than the St. Aidan's people were hard at it preparing for the service of dedication of the new extensions later that afternoon. About 80 people came to this inspiring event, with a number of former parishioners as well as community members in attendance. This was a great opportunity to present our mission statement and to explain how the new extensions would support us in our efforts to link with the community, as well as provide safe access for people with a disability and improve health and safety issues in our facility.



FROM THE BISHOP'S DESK

28 April 2008

Over April 19-20 I spent time with the Parishes of Riverlinks and St Leonard's. It was a very encouraging time meeting with the Riverlinks' Local Ministry Support Team Saturday and hearing of their blessings and challenges, and sharing ideas about appropriate liturgies, mission principles for Enabler Supported Parishes and Youth Ministry in Launceston. Sunday morning Confirmation Service at St Aidan's saw great joy as four adults testified to being disciples of Jesus Christ.

At the Confirmation Service I shared my thoughts about the significance of the faith we proclaim as we state our belief as expressed in the Apostles' Creed. I warned the congregation that by affirming that Jesus is God we were breaking the Tasmanian law of blasphemy, because the Koran says that anyone who says Jesus is God blasphemes. To which an elderly woman said loudly, "Too bad!" It was a profound moment and gave us more conviction as we recited the words of the Creed. It also reflected something of the grit and courage of Christians when their beliefs are opposed and when our Lord Jesus is diminished. We see this playing out in so many places around the world, starting close to home with daily 'Australian-speak'.

In the afternoon we dedicated the extension to the St Aidan's worship area which provides easy access, beautiful light, hospitality, a welcoming glassed meeting space clearly visible from the street, kitchen and toilet/changing facilities. I am often heard to say, "Good facilities, facilitate good ministry". It's true at St Aidan's. Thank you, to the project team.
