The Ascension of Jesus

The Ascension of Jesus is amongst the most important events in God's plan of salvation for His people. This plan, which is progressively revealed throughout the pages of scripture, consists of a number of historic events that are very well known to us and include the birth of Jesus, his death and resurrection. These events are widely celebrated in the church and the community; however, the ascension is often neglected or overlooked.

When he had led them out to the vicinity of Bethany, he lifted up his hands and blessed them. While he was blessing them, he left them and was taken up into heaven. Then they worshiped him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy. And they stayed continually at the temple, praising God.

Luke 24: 50-53 *NIV*

This is somewhat surprising, as the Resurrection (Easter) and the Ascension are very closely linked. These 2 events are always exactly 40 days apart, (He appeared to them over a period of 40 days - Acts 1:3) and both involve the transformed (resurrected) body of the risen Jesus. If Jesus had not ascended, then His transformed body would still be here on earth. Resurrection and Ascension are closely linked but quite distinct from one another.

Ascension is not unique to Jesus. In Genesis 5 we read of Enoch who walked with God; then he was no more because God took him away (Genesis 5:24). Elijah is described as ascending into heaven by means of a "chariot of fire and horses of fire". (1Kings 2:11) In the N/T we read of Paul who was caught up into paradise where he learned heavenly secrets that he must not reveal. (2Corinthians 12:4) John, the author of Revelation describes his ascension in Revelation 4:1 to 16:21 where he sees God's throne and learns heavenly secrets.

Jesus ascension is described twice in the N/T, on both occasions by the apostle Luke. In addition, there are a number of other references to his ascension throughout the N/T. Luke's descriptions appear at the very end of his gospel and the beginning of the Book of Acts.

Luke 24:36-53 and Acts 1: 1-11

The 40 days between resurrection and ascension could be seen, for the apostles, as a time of intensive study on world evangelisation. I can imagine that their heads were spinning as they came to terms with all that Jesus wanted to teach them and show them. The top priority was that they should become totally convinced of the reality of his resurrection, and so we read “After his suffering, he showed himself to these men and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of 40 days...” (1:3).

In Luke’s gospel he tells us that the apostles were startled and frightened when Jesus first appeared to them, but He showed them His wounded hands and feet and allowed them to touch Him. They also gave him a piece of broiled fish which he ate in front of them. He then reminded them that He had spoken to them about these events. “This is what I told you while I was still with you” (verse 44).

Apart from convincing the apostles of the reality of His bodily resurrection, Jesus had much that He wanted to teach them in those last 40 days. In particular He wanted to show them, from the scriptures, how all that had happened to him was in fulfilment of what had been written about him in Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms. He opened their minds to understand the Scriptures. He also linked His suffering and resurrection with repentance and the forgiveness of sins which were to be preached in Jesus name to all nations beginning in Jerusalem.

The apostles were to be Jesus’ witnesses to all nations of all that He had shown them, beginning at Jerusalem. But first they were to wait until they had been clothed with power from on high. That power was the Holy Spirit that they could not receive until Jesus had been taken from them.

Jesus had convinced them of the fact of His resurrection; He had shown them that all that had happened to Him had been foretold in the O/T scriptures;

After he said this, he was taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid him from their sight.

They were looking intently up into the sky as he was going, when suddenly two men dressed in white stood beside them. “Men of Galilee,” they said, “why do you stand here looking into the sky? This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into heaven.”

Acts 1: 9-11 ^{NIV}

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He had commissioned them to preach the gospel to all nations beginning in Jerusalem. Now it was time for Him to depart so that they could be empowered by the Holy Spirit and begin their task of global evangelisation.

Exactly what occurred at the Ascension is unclear; however, it would seem that it all happened very quickly. “While He was blessing them, he left them and was taken up into heaven” (Luke 24:31). “After He said this, He was taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid Him from their sight (Acts1:9).

In the Acts passage two men dressed in white stood beside the apostles and encouraged them with the promise that Jesus would one day come back in the same way that they had seen Him go into heaven. (Acts 1:11) We continue to await the fulfilment of that wonderful promise.

These accounts of the events surrounding Jesus ascension highlight three important truths that we would do well to apply in our own lives.

Firstly, we need to have confidence in our belief in the bodily resurrection of Jesus. Jesus went to great lengths to ensure that all the apostles shared this certainty. “He showed himself to these men and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive.” (Acts 1:3) We need to have this certainty, not only for the sake of our own salvation, but also so that we can convince others of this foundational truth. If you have difficulty accepting the bodily resurrection of Jesus, then ask him to convince you of this truth just as he did for the apostles some 2000 years ago.

Secondly, if we are to be effective witnesses, we need to know the scriptures in the way that Jesus taught. We need to understand how the O/T scriptures foreshadow the ministry of Jesus and how as a result of this, repentance and forgiveness of sins are preached in his name across the globe. A number of people across the parish have done or are doing

the “E100 Bible Challenge”. E100 is a series of 100 readings designed to give the participant an overview of the whole bible. No doubt, a number of the passages that Jesus looked at with the apostles are also included in E100. Would you like to know more? Then visit www.e100challenge.com.au

Finally, just before his ascension, Jesus commissioned the apostles to take the gospel throughout the world, but first they must wait until they had been “clothed with power from on high”. This promise was, of course, fulfilled at Pentecost and continues to be fulfilled as Christians take the gospel into every corner of the earth. We are no longer awaiting the gift of the Holy Spirit in the way that the apostles were, but we are awaiting the bodily return of Jesus “when the times will have reached their fulfilment.” (Ephesians 1:10)

May we be found ready and waiting on that day?

Nurturing disciples or, in other words, Christian mothers, come in many shapes, sizes, colours, and faiths with differing talents but we all have something in common – we are all wonderfully made by God. As mothers we know that our children are not going to get the full and proper message of Jesus unless they see it in action in our homes and community.

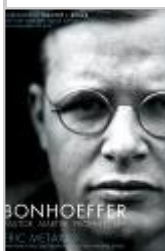
Dietrich Bonhoeffer Lecture

Learning for Life



What's in a name?

I am often asked why Moore College is called a “Theological College” rather than a “Bible College”. Because the word “theological” sounds rather obscure to many Christians today, some people refer to Moore College as a “Bible College”.

They are not wrong. The foundation and centre of all that we do at Moore College is the study of God’s written word, the Bible. All that is taught and learnt is measured by this standard. At Moore College we are firmly convinced of the authority of Scripture, the clarity of Scripture and the sufficiency of Scripture. The ministry for which our students are preparing is a ministry of God’s Word. People become Christians, grow into mature believers, and learn to live a godly life as the Holy Spirit applies God’s Word to human minds and hearts. Christian pastors lovingly and clearly bring God’s Word to people. Those who study at Moore College are therefore thoroughly soaked in the Bible. This is intentional, important and one of the distinctive marks of Moore College. I am not surprised that some call Moore College a “Bible College”. Of course it is!

However when we call the College a “Theological College”, we are drawing attention to the purpose of our study of God’s Word. We do not study the Bible in order to know the Bible. We study the Bible in order to know God. The Bible is not just any book. It is God’s own Word about his Son, the Lord Jesus. The Living God has spoken the words of the Bible (cf. 2 Pet 1:21), and he speaks those words today by the power of his Spirit (e.g. Heb 3:7). What the Bible says, God says. To hear the Bible is to hear God’s voice. To believe the Bible is to believe God. We therefore study the Bible in a particular way and for a very special purpose. We study prayerfully in order to know, love, trust and obey our wonderful, gracious and holy God through faith in Jesus Christ.

It is possible to study the Bible differently. In universities the Bible can be studied as a collection of merely human documents. Many students who study the Bible in that way certainly get to know the Bible (in one sense), but unless they receive God’s Word as it actually is, the Word of God, they will not know God (cf. 1 Thess 2:13).

When we call Moore College a “Theological College”, we are emphasising the purpose and goal of our studies: knowing God (Greek, theos).

Furthermore as a “theological” college Moore College is concerned that knowing God shapes and illuminates all of our thinking and living. A person who knows God sees all of life differently from a person who does not know God. Of course our knowledge of God is always (in this world) limited (1 Cor 13:12). Neither do we find it easy and natural for our thinking, understanding and living to be godly. At our theological college we work hard at growing in godly thinking, understanding and living.

That is why Moore College is a Bible College and a Theological College.

Mothers Maintenance Manual

Many of us take better care of our cars than we do our mothers and yet we only expect our cars to last 5 or 6 years but we expect our mothers to last for a lifetime.

Maybe we need a maintenance manual for mothers so we would know how to take care of them at least as well as we do our cars.

Here are some items that might be included in such a manual:

- ♦ **Engine:** A mother's engine is one of the most dependable kinds you can find. She can reach top speed from a prone position at a single cry from a sleeping child. But regular breaks are needed to keep up that peak performance. Mothers need a hot bath and a nap every 100 miles, a baby-sitter and a night out every 1,000 miles, and a live in baby-sitter with a one week vacation every 10,000 miles
- ♦ **Battery:** Mother's batteries should be recharged regularly. Handmade items, notes, unexpected hugs and kisses, and frequent "I love you's" will do very well for a recharge
- ♦ **Carburetor:** When a mother's carburetor floods it should be treated immediately with Kleenex and a soft shoulder
- ♦ **Brakes:** See that she uses her brakes to slow down often and come to a full stop occasionally. (A squeaking sound indicates a need for a rest)
- ♦ **Fuel:** Most mothers can run indefinitely on coffee, leftovers and salads, but an occasional dinner for two at a nice restaurant will really add to her efficiency
- ♦ **Chassis:** Mother when their bodies are properly maintained. Regular exercise should be encouraged and provided for as necessary. A change in hairdo or makeup in spring and autumn are also helpful. If you notice the chassis begins to sag, immediately start a program of walking, jogging, swimming, or bike riding. These are most effective when done with fathers
- ♦ **Tune-ups:** Mother need regular tune-ups. Compliments are both the cheapest and most effective way to keep a mother purring contentedly

If these instructions are followed consistently, this fantastic creation and gift from God, that we call MOTHER should last a lifetime and give good service and constant love to those who need her most.
