

We must keep our eyes on Jesus, who leads us and makes our faith complete.

From the Enabler

Perseverance

I'm just going through the motions with church. I'm tired and discouraged; sometimes feeling guilty. I also feel like an alien in my own culture. And most discouraging of all: Some our church's keenest members have gone back to their old lives. You might be surprised to know something else about me. I'm a follower of Jesus in the first century. My church is the one that the book vou call 'Hebrews' was written to. There you can hear God's urging to stay with his Son and not give up.

I'd like you to look up Hebrews chapter 12. It answers the question that we all ask: 'How do I not lose heart but stick with Jesus?' See the 'Therefore' that links verse 1 with chapter 11. The 'cloud of witnesses' are the faithful believers in chapter 11 who witnessed to God's faithfulness; inspiring examples of gritty faith that's defined for us 11:1; people who were convinced that God would keep his gospel promises. looked forward to Christ and the New Creation and desired them more than anything else. That's the sort of faith that pleases God (11:6). That's why



it's catastrophic when people 'throw their away confidence' (10:35) and shrink back from Christ and his people (10:37-39, 25). Let them and the faithful believers in chapter 11 and in your own life (can you think of them?) provoke you to keep living by faith in God's promises.

See how that's described at the end of 12:1 - An endurance That word 'endurance' race. keeps coming up doesn't it? Back in 10:36 God says that we have need of endurance - so that we'll receive what God has promised (10:34) and not miss out (10:39). Remember Jesus himself said that the love of many will grow cold. 'But the one who endures to the end will be saved' (Mt 24:12-13). Our final salvation's at stake!

So our question, 'How do I not lose How do I not heart but stick with Jesus until the end?' is crucially important.

lose heart but stick with Jesus?

God likens our life of faith to a race that he sets before us (12:1). He has determined the specific course of your life your upbringing, illnesses. setbacks and accomplishments, and the irresistible call to follow Christ. It is your race that you with endurance. must run Knowing that helps me not compare my race to another's; to accept mine as from God.

Meet John Stephen Akhwari. He represented Tanzania in the men's marathon at the 1968 Mexico Olympic Games. The winner had finished over an hour earlier, but John pressed on, pain hobbling his every step, his leg bloody and bandaged. When he crossed the finish line, a reporter asked him why he'd not retired from the race, since he had no chance of winning. I love his answer: 'My country did not send me to Mexico City to start the race. They sent me to finish.'



As the 'founder of our faith' (12:2), Jesus has called us to our race to finish it. All who finish are winners – remember the faithful in chapter 11. You don't have to be first, but you have to finish.

God enables us to finish by urging us to persevere and by the example of others who did. And in 12:1-3 he tells us how to run with endurance: 'Lav aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely.' Imagine a marathon runner pulling behind them a bag of concrete. What's in your bag? What good, bad or unhelpful things are weighing you down and threatening to pull you up short? Excessive busyness, a relationship, habit, ministry situation? We're also to lay aside the sin that clings to us and trips us up. Imagine a runner with his underpants down around his ankles. what unseemly thing(s) are you running with? It's so important that we finish that we must lay these things aside. Will you do that?

And we're to look to Jesus (12:2) and consider him who endured (12:3). The words mean to fix your gaze upon, to contemplate, Jesus. Because he faithfully endured his race, at great cost, then was glorified (12:2).

He endured the shame of being nailed to a cross, because he knew that later on he would be glad he did. Now he is seated at the right side of God's throne!

mind on Jesus, who put up with many insults from sinners. Then you won't get discouraged and give up.

So keep your

continued from previous page From the place of supreme authority he will see to it that you finish your race. He will perfect what he began in you. But you must be careful to follow his directions: to lay aside the weights and sins, and to keep looking to Him. Driven by the promise of future joy, he endured...thinking nothing of the shame of the cross (12:2).

As for Jesus so for us, there is shame, rejection and alienation, sometimes even from the established church. Have you grown weary and fainthearted from it all? Jesus and our hope eclipse our shame and our pain. Don't take your eyes off either!



A man was in a hurry taking his eight-year-old son to school and made a turn at a red light where it was prohibited.



Why kids stop going to church

One of the great pleasures about being at the same church for a long time is that you get to see children grow up from infants into young adults.

As a member of the same church for seventeen years, many of which I originally served as the Senior Minister, I baptised many babies who grew to become leaders of the children's and youth ministries. I saw a church with hardly any kids in Sunday School and youth group grow into a Christian community with hundreds of young people.

How did the church grow? Well, under God's grace and sovereignty, Christian parents did the most important thing they could ever do - they led their children in Christ.

Yet in these seventeen years at *St George North Anglican*, I have also seen some children drop out of church. This sad outcome happens for many reasons, both theological and practical.

But of these reasons, two stand out, which I will explore in more detail below.

1. Kids stop going when their parents are slack in their church attendance

When mum and dad stop going to church, they teach their children that church isn't really that important.

Whether we like it or not, children learn as much from what we do as what we say. When we easily skip church for weak excuses, we teach our kids that gathering together with others around God's word is really not as important as the many other temptations upon our time and attention.

The sad reality is that many parents choose for their kids to be football players rather than Christians. When Sunday morning sport is on, they push their kids there, rather than take them to church, and then wonder when they reach adulthood, why their kids no longer have any interest in Christianity.

They make other things a priority for their kids other than church, and then wonder why their children are binge drinking or on drugs or pregnant and hanging around with people that have destructive influence upon them!

Some people have great difficulty coming to church

2. Kids stop coming when their parents don't pastor their own children

Children stopped coming to church when their parents delegated the upbringing of their kids to the church.

Don't leave it to the Kids' Club or Sunday School teachers to do it – it's your job! It's the primary job of Christian parents to raise their children into missional disciples for the Lord. The Sunday School teachers are there only to supplement what you are already teaching your kids abut Jesus at home.

How sad it is to see some church-going parents treat their voung children as little unbelievers that will need to be converted one day, when they get old enough to understand everything and make up their own minds what is right and Don't be like them! wrong. children Raise vour Christians, from day one!

In families where the parents didn't pray and read the Bible with their kids, the children didn't value the Scriptures, and therefore the voices of others have taken them away from the voice of God

You want your children to spend eternity in heaven, don't you? Therefore, show them you love them by showing them Jesus Christ in the Bible every day. Read and discuss the Bible with them. Pray with them. Love them.

When should you start praying with your child, reading the Scriptures with them and taking them to church? Soon after coming home with them from the hospital!

It is simply never too early to raise children as Christians, in a Christian environment with Christian habits and values.

Grace-filled parenting

I give thanks to God that

children still grow up to become mature Christian adults, even when their parents miss the mark in many ways. I am eternally thankful to my heavenly Father for helping my own adult and nearly-adult children grow up as believers, despite the times I failed to be the perfect Christian father.

Yet, by making church our number-one priority, and by taking the time to pray and read the Bible with my family, God was pleased to have my girls grow into keen Christians, by his power, for his glory.

And remember that the same grace that grows our kids is the same grace that God shows us, as parents. There's still time to create new habits for your family ... today is the first day of the rest of your family life! Make a bold move, for the sake of your kids, and for the glory of God.

Parish Financial Report July to December 2012

Expenditure *Budget* \$141,910 \$146,462

The first half of the financial year is operating close to budget with some itemised variations.

The offertory is \$4500 under budget target and the Children and family Ministry offering is on budget.

The Finlay Estate has provided \$50000 to work on St Aidan's buildings. This is not included in the Parish Income.

The redevelopment of St Oswald's Hall was completed in September. The tender cost was \$137450, when finished the builder had made a saving of \$1000. The amount required from the Parish capital account was \$90000 to finance the project.

The other cost increase for the parish is power expenditure, this is \$2000 above budget. If anyone has any bright thoughts on Solar energy I would like to hear from them.

The office is undergoing a refurbishment and should be completed shortly.

Finally, the target for the next 6 months is to have the offering reach the budget figure.
