Run Away! Run Away!

Have you ever noticed the four great flights in Paul's letters? There are four places where Paul tells his readers to flee: flee from immorality (1 Cor sexual 6:18); flee from idolatry (1 Cor 10:14); flee these things - conceit, controversy and the love of money (1 Tim 6:11); flee youthful passions (2 Tim 2:22). This is a strong word to use. Paul uses it sparingly. It invites two big questions: what should we flee? And why?

The word that we translate as 'flee' is the same root word from which we get our word 'fugitive'. If you've ever seen the movie The Fugitive, with Harrison Ford, you'll get a picture of the sort of action that Paul is referring to when he tells his readers to flee. Ford's character in that movie is charged with the murder of his wife, and he flees, trying desperately to stay free while he clears his name. He recognises that he cannot hope to stand and fight - the forces of the

police simply are too overwhelming for him to any prospect have of overcoming them. He also recognises that he will not flee just the once, but that he will need to flee again and again as the police close in, until he catches the true killer or else is caught himself.

In a similar way, the word 'flee' in each of these passages carries the idea of constant flight. We will never finished fleeing these things while we remain in this Each of the sins or temptations that Paul warns of is persistent and overwhelming. Persistent in that we are constantly beset these snares: by whelming in that we cannot overcome them in our own strength.



What must we flee from?

The list of things that Paul warns us to flee from brings no real surprises. Take a moment to look over the list in the first paragraph of this article! Alongside sexual immorality and idolatry, the list of things to flee from includes false doctrine. conceit, quarrels, dissention, greed, envy (1 Tim 2:3-10), controversies and youthful Tim 2:22). passions (2 Although this might look at first glance to be an arbitrary grab bag of vices, there is a unifying idea to them all. Understanding this unifying idea is the key to understanding why they are so dangerous that Paul urges us to fleel

Why flee?

The unifying idea behind all these vices is that of idolatry. It is easy in our modern world to shrug off the risk that idolatry poses, because we have a caricatured idea of what idolatry is. We look at idolatry as it is portrayed in Bible or in popular (movies and TV culture series), and we see primitive people bowing down to stone statues, praying for good weather, safe travel or abundant crops. We chuckle quietly and congratulate ourselves that we are more enlightened than they are. And then we go and seek our security from the stock market idol, or our happiness from the shopping mall idol, or our satisfaction from the internet pornography idol.

Idolatry is the sin of placing anything - good, bad or indifferent - in the place that God properly occupies. When we seek our life purpose in our own careers or personal ambitions, we are placing those things in God's place. When we seek our comfort in food or drink, we place those things in God's place. When we elevate our own opinions, understanding or teaching above that of Jesus and the Bible, then we are elbowing ourselves into God's role!

Can you see now why the things we should flee are connected in character by idolatry? And can you see why it is so important to flee these things?

Deborah Ann Belka If we shove Jesus out of his proper priority (and remember that Paul is writing to people who identify as Christians!), then we are at risk of rejecting his gift of eternal life.

We risk choosing the lesser gift (food, drink, leisure, job satisfaction, sex, family etc) over the greater gift (Jesus, the Kingdom of God, eternal life!). For this reason Paul's statement that unrighteous will not inherit the Kingdom of God' (1 Cor 6:9) makes sense - those who chase after sex, or wealth, or other religions, or self-aggrandizement are disinheriting themselves.

If we want a part of God's new creation and perfect Kingdom, then there are things we need to flee. In the words of Monty Python: 'Run away! Run away!'

What are we running to?

But what about God's mercy and forgiveness? Doesn't God promise forgiveness to those who confess and turn back to him? Yes, he does. But do you see just what that involves? It involves confess-

ion – an acknowledgement of the wrongfulness of our idolatry - and it involves turning away from it. It is simply not possible to dally with sexual immorality, love of money, constant controversy, or false teaching, while turning away from it! It is, in fact, nonsensical to say that we are seeking God's forgiveness for sin, while we continue to indulge in that sin. Our very act of turning to God and sin away from and temptation is the act of constantly fleeing from the snares laid around us.

Now this starts to make sense of Paul's words in 2 Timothy 2:22: 'pursue righteousness, faith, love and peace, along with those who call on the Lord from a pure Where do we go heart.' when flee from we overpowering sin and temptation? We run back to the Lord, to his promise of fruitful work, wholeness and abundant life. We run right back to Jesus and into his kingdom.

Slow-cooked prayer is the best kind

Blessed are they who can laugh at themselves for they shall never cease to be amused When my children were really young, my wife and I became used to eating our meals at a very fast rate. Looking after four active, young children, we had to! But when we were able to arrange a childless dinner night for the two of us we interesting an development transpired. We discovered that we were able to travel, sit down, order. eat, chat and be ready to go home again in all of about an hour. No, we did not dislike each other's company and no, the restaurant food and environment were not bad, and no, we were not the type of parents who were overly concerned and possessive of our children that we needed to go back home quickly. Rather, we had become so used to eating our meals at such a fast pace that when given the space and opportunity to eat at a slow and uninterrupted failed to slow speed we down. We then missed the enjoyment of а contemplative and delectable time of eating and enjoying each other's company.

Taking this situation and applying it to our prayer lives,

we can sometimes see correlation with allowing our fast-paced lives to pattern our engagement in this way with God. We sit down with God, maybe quickly read a passage of Scripture present a speedy prayer, and then we are off again. Failing to ensure space to ponder over God's word in prayer, to revel in his company and to delight in our relationship with him means We short-change our spiritual lives. We need to see our prayer life in relationship to God more like a slow cooker crockpot, where flavours of God's Holy Spirit seep into our souls, rather than instantaneous. an frozen, microwave meal. As apostle demonstrates, the Christian faith is more like a marathon than a sprint (1 Corinthians 9:24-26; also Hebrews 12:1). The Bible calls this slow encounter of solitude and connection 'meditation'. (Psalm 48:9; Psalm 199:15, 23, 27, 48). Meditation, in a scriptural Christian and sense, is the time when we reflect on God's word and relational engage in connection with God through prayer. This image of meditation is particularly captured in the first few verses of Psalm 1, where we see meditation on God's word giving sustenance, root structure, and growth to the person of faith.

Prayer with God is understanding that we are in a relationship with the safest, most caring, most grace-full and powerful person in the whole universe, who wants us to connect with him.

Prayer is not complicated per se. It is simple in many respects because it is about conversation with God and a developing awareness of his presence with us (1 Thess 5:17).
