Fighting The Inner Gourmet

I have a well-thumbed copy of C. S. Lewis' book The Screwtape Letters. For those who aren't familiar with the book, it is a fictional account of a series of letters from Screwtape, a senior devil, to 'nephew' Wormwood, who is on his first tempter's assignment on Through the eyes of these two devils, you get to trace spiritual life οf the Wormwood's 'patient' as he becomes a Christian and then develops in faith until his death during WWII.

One chapter that stood out to me on re-reading it recently had Screwtape encouraging his nephew to lead the 'patient' around a string of different churches, rather than committing to worship at one. His reasoning was ...

In the first place the parochial (local) organisation should always be attacked, because, being a unity of place and not of likings, it brings people of different classes and psychology together in the

kind of unity that the Enemy desires... In the second place, the search for a "suitable" church make the man a critic where the Enemy wants him to be a pupil.

(Remember that this is fictional devil talking, so 'the Enemy' is how Screwtape refers to God.)

It seems to me that Lewis puts his finger on some dangers for modern Christians and our relationship with the body of Christ.

Firstly, we can develop an overly casual attitude meeting regularly. Almost everything in our culture is a 'low-commitment' activity. (I know that there are some things that we do commit to firmly. We wouldn't dare miss footy training, or one of the kids soccer games! And that, on the whole, is a good thing.) But we only go shopping if we feel like it. We hold off on weekend plans until the last minute. We don't sign up for camps, buy concert tickets, book travel holiday make o r commitments until the eleventh hour. We click 'maybe' on facebook invitations.

This 'if I feel like it' attitude can very easily flow over into our church involvement. After all, society views it as a voluntary activity. And if we're not really going to get much out of it, then shouldn't we sleep in on Sunday and spend time with family?

The trouble with this attitude is that it neglects the very real claim that Jesus has on each of our lives. We do not belong to ourselves, but to Christ who bought us at the cost of his life (1 Cor 6:19-20). And although Paul was writing these words in the of context our sexual principle behaviour. the remains the same - what we consider 'ours' - our bodies, our minds, our thoughts, our time, our energy - really belongs to Him. And He has given us a clear pattern of regularly meeting with His people (eg Acts 2:42-47), and also clear instruction to continue meeting together (Heb 10:24-25). The purpose of this is to have the space and time to help each other to hold fast to our faith (Heb 10:23), to stir each other up to good works (Heb 10:24), to exhort one another to righteousness and to resist the deceitfulness of sin (Heb 3:13), to be equipped for ministry, build up the body of Christ and grow to maturity in Christ (Eph 4:11-16).

Secondly, we modern Christians are at risk of church shopping. We are so spoiled for choice of where and how we worship, and whom we invite to disciple us. We have become 'church connoisseurs'.

What He (God) wants of the lavman in church is an attitude which may, indeed, be critical in the sense of rejecting what is false or unhelpful, but which is wholly uncritical in the sense that it does not appraise - does not waste time in thinking about what it rejects, but lays itself open in uncommenting, humble receptivity to any nourishment that is going ... There is hardly any sermon, or any book, which may not be dangerous to us if it is received in this temper.

Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of people in their deceitful scheming.

So do not throw away your confidence; it will be richly rewarded.
You need to persevere so that when you have done the will of God, you will receive what he has promised.

Hebrews 10:35-36 NIV

As Lewis remarks, we are at risk of developing an attitude towards the church (and I don't just mean Sunday services) that critical. is rather than receptive. Instead of giving where we can, and receiving from God what He has seen fit to provide, we place ourselves in a position of judgment on how church is done, or who it is done with. And if we are not please, we vote with our feet. No doubt there is a place for discernment - for ensuring that the members of our family are being fed, and that what they are being fed is true and biblical (e.g. Acts 17:11). But no church is perfect - every church should consciously be a hospital of the soul, where broken and sinful people come together to receive from God what they need for life. It is therefore important to settle, commit and contribute.

Thirdly, and most subtly, we can develop a 'gourmet' taste for church. True we might remain in the one faith community. We might attend regularly. But our attitude can remain hard and judgmental. Perhaps the

music wasn't really up to scratch. Or the sermon was dull. Or the bible study was superficial. Or the prayers weren't really very inspiring. the flowers Perhaps banners or pew sheets or coffee or one of a hundred other details weren't quite right. And our attention is captured by these minute details such that we miss the presence of the living God! We miss his words to us. How ludicrous that we don't hear the words of the Creator of the Universe because we didn't like the first song!

So how can we avoid these pitfalls? And, for those of us with children or teenagers, how can we prepare them for church engagement in a way that helps them to receive what is available with gratitude and without grumbling? How can prepare for church as servant of Jesus and son of rather than God. as consumer or a critic? (I'm grateful to John Piper for these observations, from his blog at www.desiringgod.org/ blog/posts/how-do-youprepare-for-sunday)

- 1.We can prepare to receive. We should expect to meet God as we hear His Word read and explained, as we sing His praises. We can prepare for this by praying for humble, grateful and receptive hearts. We can prepare by *reading* in advance the portions of Scripture that we expect to hear, and meditating on (or thinking about) them. With children, this might look like reading from a child-friend bible translation (CEV and NIrV are great translations), and praying simply with them the God would speak to us. These are useful things to do before meeting with God's people in any setting - Sunday service, weekday evening home group, prayer group etc.
- 2.We can prepare to respond. We should not expect to remain unmoved by God's presence among us! We should pray that God would create soft us, that will hearts in respond to Him in love and obedience. might We reflect on and repent of anything that stands in the way of us responding to God.

3.We can prepare to serve others. God chooses to use ordinary people to build up and bless each other. What an amazing privilege! God can use everyone, from the smallest and least of us, to highest those with the profile and most obvious gifts. Your part might be a prayer with someone, an encouraging word to a challenging child. a question for a friend, a kind gesture to a stranger, or a greeting warm newcomer. We can prepare by praying that God will use us to edify the church, and by discussing beforehand the opportunities that be presented. might Particularly with children, it can be helpful to talk over, even role play, a new before thev situation

So don't play into the hands of our enemy! Make the most of your time with God and His people, approaching Him, and them, with gentle, humble, receptive hearts.





My friend recently got crushed by a pile of books, but he's only got his shelf to blame. Most of you know or know of Job Edmunds, our trainee youth worker. Job has been working with us for the past 18 months, primarily building up and working in our youth ministry with our partners at St John's Launceston. Well recently we've had an exciting opportunity to expand Job's hours and role with us.

Thanks to a generous grant from Clarendon Children's Services, and from the Diocese of Tasmania, we will be able to employ Job for 30 hours per week (he currently has 12), to:

- Connect with disadvantaged and 'at risk' youths in high schools in disadvantaged areas of Launceston and George Town;
- Connect with youths who are involved in the criminal justice system, and who are at risk of a custodial sentence;
- To act as a 'bridge' between these youths experiencing disadvantage, and volunteers from the parish of Riverlinks;

This is exciting an opportunity for our mission to our local community, and Job is absolutely the right person for the job! But the initiative will only work if we are able to get behind him and support him - if the local community sees connecting with voung people because we love God and love them! This is where the opportunity is for real growth of the Kingdom, and for real transformation in the lives of young people.

Please commit with me to praying for Job and the young people he will meet, and for volunteers to step up and offer what they can. Medical Precision

I had a total knee replacement recently and I wanted the doctor and his team of blue-coated, blue-masked and blue-capped scalpel-wielding assistants to go in for precision overkill.

Robotics, computer generated models, keyhole surgery, second opinions; bring them on. I wanted nothing left to chance, guesswork or near enough is good enough. I wanted, and I want exactitude.

Relational Precision

This different kind of precision is no less critical.

We must treat each other with care and compassion. With humility and understanding. With gentleness and grace. With integrity and truthfulness. This is relational precision.

And when we fail to do this, we must seek to amend,

heal, restore and reconcile. This, too, is relational precision.

I spoke to a person abruptly the other day and I quickly sought to address the matter and the manner. Even if I thought the matter was one of principle, the manner still needed remedial attention.
