Night Will Shine Like The Day

When I was four, my parents took me to Taronga Park Zoo in Sydney. We went there with my grandparents, uncle and aunt and cousins, and my baby brother. We took the ferry across from Circular Quay, and then a bus from the dock up to the top entrance of the zoo. (In case you've never been to Taronga Park, the whole zoo is on a hillside, and there's a top and a bottom entrance. The bottom entrance is right next to the ferry dock. My parents wisely decided to spend the day walking downhill rather than up!)

As the morning unfolded, we wandered down through the gardens, paths and exhibits, seeing all that the zoo had to offer. Around lunchtime we came to a fairly central park or picnic area, and my grandmother, ever well prepared, brought out our picnic lunch.

My two cousins were about 6 and 4 years older than me, and they bolted their food down and pestered the grownups to be allowed to go

play. My mum asked me if I wanted to go play too, but I said no, so my cousins ran off towards the play equipment and disappeared around the corner of a garden.

Well you can guess what came next. I changed my mind. Without a word to either of my parents, I trotted off as fast as my four-year-old legs could carry me, disappearing around the same corner as my cousins. Or so I thought.

It turns out that I had gone in completely the wrong direction, and before too long I was utterly and hopelessly lost. I wandered along endless asphalt paths, past cages filled with brightly coloured birds, and under the shade of plants and shrubs with enormous, glossy green leaves. I have no memory of how long I was wandering, but at some point a couple must have noticed that I looked lost, and asked me if I needed help.

Fortunately, this couple took and more about his love. along to the zoo administration, who were able to put an announcement over the public address system and re-unite me with my stressed and anxious parents. (Of course, I only ever heard an abbreviated version of their side of the story some years later, but they told me that one reason they were so worried was that there had been an abduction from nearby in the weeks before our visit. I had no comprehension of such danger!)

This story came to mind recently, as ľve been meditating on the words of psalm 139. That psalm is a wonderful reflection of God's deep knowledge of us, of his all-encompassing care for us, and of his limitless capacity to reach us wherever we are. If you haven't read the psalm lately, pause for a moment and read it!

Brian Rosner, writing about the concept of being known by God, has noted that being known by God is less about God's omniscience (ie, his ability to know everything),

We draw a distinction in everyday speech between knowing someone (which implies some form of relationship, and usually a level of regard, love or intimacy) and knowing about someone (which is usually just about having information about them). This same distinction is true when we think of God knowing us. He doesn't just know about us he knows us and loves us.

I was really struck by this when I was reading verses 11 and 12 of the psalm lately:

If I say, "Surely the darkness will hide me and the light become night around me," even the darkness will not be dark to you;

the night will shine like the day,

for darkness is as light to you.

I had always read these verses against the background of all those verses in the New Testament which talk about people preferring darkness:

Christ Jesus our Lord. Romans 6:22.23 NIV

Richard, my friend's little grandson came home from Sunday School and I asked him what they had studied.

His reply was, "Nothing."

So I asked him, "Didn't you study Jesus?"

"No," Richard replied, "He wasn't even there." 'Light has come into the world, but men loved darkness instead of light because their deeds were evil.' – John 3:19


- 'Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life.' – John 8:12
- 'For although they knew God, they neither glorified him as God nor gave thanks to him, but their thinking because futile and their foolish hearts were darkened.' – Romans 1:21
- 'The night is nearly over; the day is almost here. So let us put aside the deeds of darkness and put on the armour of light.' – Romans 13:12
- 'For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord.' – Ephesians 5:8

The image that I had in my mind was that the psalmist was recognising that God could see through the psalmist's own darkness to his own dark deeds and wicked thoughts. That God knew all the evil and wrong things that lay in the psalmist's heart. This is true (as it is true for us all), but it

didn't seem to carry a lot of comfort, and didn't really seem to fit all that well in its place in the psalm!

Then I realised that there is another meaning in verses 11 and 12 of psalm 139. These words could equally well be the cry of a lost child - "I can't find my way back, and my dad will not be able to get to me." Is there a more wretched thought? To be lost, beyond the limits of my own capacity, and also beyond the help of those who love me? Yet the psalm affirms that, with God, this will never happen. No matter how far we have strayed, how lost we become, God knows and loves us. 'Darkness is as light' to him.

This realisation has changed my thinking about the psalm dramatically. These verses don't talk of God as though he were sifting through my dark secrets, looking for some way to catch me out. Rather, he is a loving father, willing and able to reach me even in the midst of darkness, and to bring me into the light.


