

Sanctuary

Australia. Across many communities church have stated publically that they will open the doors of their church buildings and offer a place of sanctuary to asylum seekers who are under threat of being returned or sent to off shore detention centres. The number of church communities with representation across many denominations that have added their name to the list since the Cathedral in Brisbane announced its plan to be a place of sanctuary is now over seventy.

So what is it all about and does it have anything to do with us, the church communities of Riverlinks?

Should we be doing anything and is it something we should be talking about?

The answer is yes.

In the last two and a half years over one hundred Christian leaders, again from across a broad range of denominations have been arrested in Australia for peacefully sitting and praying in politicians offices. Many have been let off with a warning but others have been exposed to the extremes of being strip searched and being fined.

What is happening in Australia that is causing this ripple through our normally sedate and peaceful church existence? What is it that drives Christians to stand against government policy and declare that they are prepared to be arrested in doing so? What is it that causes a church community to decide to break the law and risk ten years in prison for doing so?

I am a member of the grass roots Christian organisation called Love Makes A Way. It is everything I was raised not to do. That isn't why I joined, but it certainly causes us to question those traditional values of Church not mixing with state. I have been involved in three actions in Tasmania, including one where I risked arrest.

l've been growing increasingly restless as I reflect on the chasm between what I know in my heart is important, and what I actually do. I don't want to settle. I don't want to give up. I want to know God better. And while my goal isn't to wake at 5am every morning for a 2-hour devotional. I know that there's a lot of room to grow to prioritise this relationship in deed and not just word. And, as famous prayer warrior, A.W. Tozer, a preacher hungry for the Lord, once put it: "The man who would truly know God must give time to him."

In God's kindness, I've been spending much more time with God in recent months, and I have pursued a new devotional habit that has continued uninterrupted for 79 days (and hopefully still going by the time this goes to print!).

To some, this won't sound like a long time at all. And you're right! But for many years I have been so inconsistent with my time with the Lord that even this short pattern of daily devotions has been cause for celebration.

Along the way, I've been delighted to discover that desire has followed discipline. I'm not excited to admit it, but I often don't want to read the Bible. And desire is a powerful force. Earlier this year John Piper made a blunt assessment of why we don't read the Bible. He said: "The reason we don't read the Bible is because we don't want to read the Bible."

If I wanted to read the Bible and spend time with the Lord, I would. But too often I don't want to and I don't. And yet, I can say that as I have persevered, the desire has been slowly growing. And as I pray that it continues, I'm also glad I didn't wait for desire to get started.

If you can relate to this frustration and desire to grow, I'd like to share with you – not as an expert but as a brother – some of the things that have helped me. *See the full article at www.biblesociety.org.au/category/news/christian-living

While there are many challenges and priorities competing for our time – make time for God. You won't regret it.

I worship you with all my heart. Don't let me walk away from your commands.

I treasure your word above all else; it keeps me from sinning against you.

I praise you, Lord! Teach me your laws.

What God has said isn't only alive and active!

It is sharper than any double-edged sword.

His word can cut through our spirits and souls and through our joints and marrow, until it discovers the desires and thoughts of our hearts.

How's your quiet time?

Imagine a nutritionist who doesn't eat vegetables. Or a personal trainer who doesn't exercise.

It's difficult to imagine, isn't it? These activities are so central to what these professionals know to be "life to the full" that it would be quite a shock if they didn't actually do them.

Now, imagine a Christian who doesn't spend regular time with the Lord.

It's a scenario that should be just as shocking, but may in fact be very easy to imagine because it is the common experience of many Christians in Australia today.

Never before have we had such universal access to the Bible – paper, audio, phone, tablet, computer, television, even on your watch! And yet according to the Bible Society, only 2 out of 10 Australians are engaging with God's word on a daily basis. This isn't 2 out of 10 Australians. This is 20 per cent of Australian Christians!

It's a staggering statistic that highlights an awkward

contradiction that many Christians know far too well: We believe that time with the Lord is important, but we don't spend time with the Lord. I confess that this too often describes me. And the more I speak with my brothers and sisters, the more I realise that I am far from alone.

In a recent survey of 300 Christians, I invited people to rank from 1-10 the extent to which they agree with the statement: "It is important for Christians to spend regular time alone with God." The ranking of 10 corresponded with "strongly agree", and the average 9.5. response was surprises there.

In the next question I asked people to reflect on the current state of their devotional life on a scale of 1 -10. 10 corresponded with "extremely satisfied", and the average satisfaction ranking was 5.6. Many Christians are far from satisfied with the quality of their devotional life – is this you too?

Why would I, as a Christian, do something that is contrary to the law? Why would I risk arrest? Is this what a Christian should be doing?

To live the gospel is to do as Jesus commanded. His command is to do all things in love, for love is the greatest thing. Jesus also commanded us to follow him, his words and his actions. These are paramount to living the Christian life.

Matthew 22:35-40 (ESV)

³⁵ And one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. ³⁶ "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Law?" ³⁷ And he said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.

³⁸ This is the great and first commandment.

³⁹ And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbour as yourself. ⁴⁰ On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets."

When Jesus said this he was challenging not only the leaders of the Synagogue but all who knew that within the



Jewish faith, there are well over 600 laws that Jews must obey, so to challenge an institution and tradition of established law and reduce those laws down to two was a slap in the face to the religious authorities of the day. Jesus knew this, he was all about letting them know how wrong they were but using non-violence and love to do so. This is perhaps what angered them the most.

So what does that mean for Christians today? We have slowly and comfortably fallen into step with the state in our western societies, where we think being persecuted is when someone at work laughs at us for our foolish beliefs. We have mistaken the term peace maker as

someone who stays silent and we have forgotten that Jesus and his followers risked death and prison on a daily basis to preach the gospel. The Church in Australia has fallen into the trap of thinking that being politically correct is our guide, that we can chose which neighbour we should love. But I want to challenge that thinking, I have decided, along with many others, that being God correct is what we are called to do and to support any law or restriction that persecutes another person and that contravenes the instruction to love God and our neighbour, who we do not get to chose, is a law to be challenged, questioned and stood against. I believe that this is living the gospel. It is worth the risk of being rested or persecuted and in our country, death is not on the agenda so what is stopping us.

When God called me to work in the area of asylum seeker and refugee justice, I did my usual Jonah act. I tried to run the other way. What could I do? Who was I to challenge a government? He had chosen

the wrong person. My heart was aching for the plight of asylum seekers and it was breaking knowing how our governments treated them. But I was a busy mum and carer, with a full time job and other church commitments. I knew that what God was calling me to do would offend people, it would stir the pot, but he reminded me that he had turned over tables in the temple and he wanted me to be a table turner as well. He wanted me to use my anger, which I have plenty of, to do his work, in a loving and righteous way. He would open the doors and I just had to walk through. He still reminds me, in my ambitious drive, that he requires 'one heart at a time' and I cannot change the whole world in one grand sweep. I need my reigns pulling back from time to time as I face the frustration of negativity and attack, which has now gone well beyond a rare snigger at my 'naive faith', including many Christians who have walked away from me and have also personally attacked what I do. I work hard to act in a

non-violent loving including my words and my thoughts: I'm slowly getting better at it.

The asylum seeker issue is a huge one, we cannot solve it on our own and we need to remember that God has already conquered evil. He calls us to bring those who are clinging to the dying, desperate dark into the light.

People notice when you live the gospel, they are attracted to it, they want what you have and even anti-Christian atheist friends and strangers applaud the actions

of the church when they see Christians act according to the commands of Jesus.

What you need to do requires a conversation with God. But being brave in a society comfortable often be harder than being brave when we are in danger. Asking him to show you is the first brave step.

That is what God calls us to do, you and me: to love, bravely, and the door will be opened, hearts are being changed and turning over tables is living the gospel.
