

Called to Witness

A study group leader was teaching the principles of Bible study and she explained how to pick out the promises and the commands in Scripture, and what to do with them. Finally, having reviewed her teachings she asked, "Now, what do you do with the commands in scripture?" One member of the group raised their hand and said, "I underline them in blue."

Underlining the Bible's commands in blue might make for a colourful Bible. but the point of the commands is that we obev them. Unfortunately, there are many people who have their heads filled with information from the Bible. but they do not obey what the Bible commands. The apostle James put it like this, "Do not merely listen to the word. and so deceive vourselves." (James 1:22). Matthew recorded Jesus last instruction to his disciples as "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey, every-

thing I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always to the very end of the age." (Matt 28:19-20).

Bishop Richard in his first address to Synod highlighted the need for our Diocese to be actively engaging in the process of, "making disciples of Jesus". I am sure that this does not only apply to Anglicans because ten years ago Dallas Willard wrote a book entitled "The Great Omission," which is subtitled Reclaiming Jesus's essential teachings on discipleship. In his book, Dallas makes the point that a disciple of Jesus is not "the deluxe or heavyduty model of the Christian especially padded, textured, streamlined, and empowered for the fast lane on the straight and narrow." suggests that historically the church made converts who were baptized into church membership of a particular denomination rather than instructing them on how to be disciples who wanted to do what Jesus directed.

Bishop Richard acknowledged the many strengths within our Anglican churches but into the next life is the software of our souls.

Don't give your life over to technology then. Instead use technology to help you share your love, shine your light, and spread your joy. Use it to help others and make this world a better place. Use it in a way that makes God smile and the angels sing. And then after you are done turn it off. Remember, what



is essential is inside of you. You may be a child of technology, today but you are child of eternity, forever!

With the ever increasing speed of change in today's world I have to admit that for the first time I am beginning to feel my age. When I was a boy being online meant helping my Mom hang up my jeans on the clothesline behind our house. Twitter was what you heard from the birds in the trees. Yet, it seems like there is always a message on my screen asking me to update my software and I am concerned that as soon as I learn the new system it will already be out

went on to note that we are traditionally weak in the area of evangelism. God does not ask the world to believe without evidence. Disciples of Christ should be that evidence, we should be modelling a life worth living to those around us since in the words of Paul, "We are therefore Christ's ambassadors. as though God were making his appeal through us." (2 Cor. 5:20). Paul also the expressed special relationship that Christians have with Christ in this way, "I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself me," (Gal. 2:20).

The story of the Samaritan woman at the well, recorded in the Gospel of John (4:1-42), is a great illustration of the love and compassion of Christ. She was a Samaritan, a race of people that the Jews utterly despised as having no claim on their God, and she was an outcast and looked was down upon by her own people. This is evidenced by the fact that she came alone to draw

water from the community well when, during biblical times, drawing water and chatting at the well was the social highpoint of a woman's day. However, this woman was ostracized and marked as immoral, an unmarried woman living openly with the sixth in a series of men.

The story of the woman at the well teaches us that God loves us in spite of our bankrupt lives. God values us enough to actively seek us, to welcome us to intimacy with Him, and to rejoice in our worship. Immediately she went and reported to the people of the town that, 'He told me everything I ever did,' (John 4:29). So when the Samaritans came to him, they urged him to stay with them, and he stayed two days. And because of his words, many more became believers. "Many of the Samaritans from that town believed in him because of the woman's testimony." They said to the woman, 'We no longer believe just because of what you said; now we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this man really is the Saviour

Over the last few years, the old Penny Royal World was refurbished and opened as the Penny Royal Adventures. One of the adventures involves clipping yourself to a harness and stepping off a clifftop, in free falling for perhaps 20-30 metres and landing in a safety net below. One can watch many people making the descent and have plenty of head knowledge that the activity is safe and exhilarating. However, head knowledge is just not enough for us to step off the platform into the air when we are standing on the platform at the top of the cliff looking down at the ground far below. We need to overcome our fear, as we step into

mid-air, we need to have complete trust that the apparatus will kick into action and control our descent to the ground.

Sometimes sharing our faith can seem like stepping off a safe platform into mid-air. How many times have we wanted to share our faith, but didn't because we were afraid of failing? The apostle Peter wrote, "But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have," (1Peter 3:15). We are called to be witnesses to the good news of Christ. As we step of the platform of faith by sharing our hope in Christ, we need to put our complete trust in the Holy Spirit to do the rest. In Praise of 'Scruffy Hospitality'

What is scruffy hospitality? On his blog, Rev Jack King defines it this way:

Scruffy hospitality means you're not waiting for everything in your house to be in order before you host and serve visitors in your home. Scruffy hospitality means you hunger more for good conversation and serving a simple meal of what you have, not what you don't have. Scruffy hospitality means you're more interested in quality conversation than the impression your home or lawn makes. If we only share meals with friends when we're excellent, we aren't truly sharing life together.

He encourages people not to allow an unfinished to-do list to stop us from opening our homes to friends and family.

It's hard to let go of the belief that our homes need to be picture-perfect before we can welcome guests. But the

idea that we must make our home look un-lived in before having people over stops so many of us from sharing life together.

I have friends who are excellent housekeepers, and their homes always seem "company ready" to me. I have authentic conversations in their homes, probably because being neat and tidy is authentic for them. Authenticity invites authenticity.

But for anyone whose home is not naturally company-ready, I encourage you to embrace this concept of scruffy hospitality. Open up your home, big or small, as-is. Value community over tidiness. Invite people over and say, "I don't know what I'm serving. I may have to order pizza. I would just love your company."

"Hospitality," writes Rev Jack,
"is not a house inspection,
it's friendship."

It's more than okay to be scruffy. We can have the kind of open, welcoming home we long to have where authenticity shines, even if our kitchen floors do not.


