Collective Responsibility for Righting Past Wrongs



The Anglican Church in Tasmania is proposing to sell over 120 properties to fund its projected obligations to provide redress for survivors of child sexual abuse.

This sacrifice expresses the church's desire to provide restorative justice, recognition and support to survivors for the wrongs they have experienced by past leaders of the church.

So, who is responsible for paying for these wrongs? As the current members of the church didn't perpetrate the wrongs, one might think they should not have to pay.

But the church should pay, because taking collective responsibility for past wrongs is not only right it is profound and powerful.

I remember exactly where I was the morning former Prime Minister, Kevin Rudd made the historic apology to the aboriginal people of Australia.

I remember the tears that flowed down my face, and how proud I was at that moment to call myself an Australian.

For years the debate in Australia had raged that we, the current generation, hadn't mistreated the Aborigines, so didn't have a responsibility to say "sorry".

But how profound it was to have the nation take collective responsibility. The speech is etched in many of our minds, as the right thing for a mature nation to do.

Taking responsibility in that way was a powerful way for the country to move towards healing and restoration for the people who had been wronged in our country so many years before.

The Diocese of Tasmania has acknowledged the sins of the past. We have apologised many times for the hurts inflicted on innocent young children in its name by its leaders.

On 26 July 2000, my predecessor Bishop John Harrower, gave the following apology to victims of child sexual abuse by Anglican clergy and church workers in Tasmania. I continue to reaffirm this apology.

“...I am deeply sorry for what took place. I make an unreserved apology to those who were abused by clergy or other officers of the Anglican Church in Tasmania. My heart goes out to those of you who were abused. Those abuses should never have happened, and I pledge myself, as Bishop, to do all I can to ensure that such abuses do not happen again.”

Now we who are the church today have the opportunity to take responsibility for the next step of the apology by taking the collective costly sacrifice to provide redress to survivors.

This is a whole church collective responsibility. That is why all 48 Parishes will contribute financially to fund redress.

The heart of the Christian message is that the innocent one, Jesus of Nazareth, took the punishment for the sins of the whole world. Sins that he did not commit.

Making a costly sacrifice to right past wrongs is a profoundly Christian thing to do, and most worshipping Anglicans I have spoken to in the last weeks are prepared to do it gladly.

The Anglican Church is connected to our ancestors who gathered weekly to worship God and built the church buildings we treasure.

But we are also connected to those before us who did the wrong. As much as we appreciate the good parts of our heritage, we need to deal with the bad parts of our heritage too.

Over the past 18 years, the Anglican Church in Tasmania has worked collectively towards righting the wrongs of the past.

In 2004, the residence of the Bishop of Tasmania, “Bishopscourt” was sold for \$1.5 million and all the proceeds were used to fund our own redress scheme – the Pastoral Support and Assistance Scheme.

We have developed Safe Church Communities programs to screen, educate and develop church leaders working to ensure we don’t repeat past failures.

With Jesus as our model of costly sacrifice, the Anglican Church in Tasmania is fully committed to redress, whatever the cost.

Sit Back and Get (UN)Comfortable

If you have recently visited a train station in Melbourne, you will be familiar with the “safety zone”. It’s distinguishable by its bright yellow lines painted on the platform, signage and proximity to the platform’s entrance. I appreciate that it’s there, however, in order to get on the train and move forward on my journey, I have to step out of the safety zone rectangle.

It’s the same for our lives. Our regular routines help us maintain a productive and balanced life. If we are not careful though, a routine day can become a routine life. The routine can become our life’s yellow painted lines on the platform that keep us safe and comfortable, but at the same time, keep us from stepping out and moving forward.

In our comfort zones, we do what we’ve done before, we don’t challenge ourselves and we definitely don’t do anything we might fail at. In our comfort zones, we pat ourselves on the back and think it was all us. But God didn’t intend for us to live in our comfort zones. The more comfortable we are, the easier it is to think that we can rely on ourselves rather than on God.

We were created by Him, to be nourished by Him and to bear fruit. As we rely on Him and His provision, we can branch out from a place of comfort to a place of freedom in Him.

Cross-cultural worker, David, shares what this looks like for him in the Silk Road Area. “I step out of my comfort zone every time I need to engage with new people (which is often!). I found meeting new people uncomfortable in Australia, but without being fluent in the local language, it’s especially uncomfortable here on the Silk Road. I can have the words to say in my head, but when I meet someone new, they disappear. However, I know I have to talk to them. If we are to build relationships and share the message of Jesus, then I have to push myself out of my comfort zone and speak. And so, with God’s strength, I do.”

As a follower of Jesus, how are you being challenged to step out of your comfort zone? Seek God’s will in your decision making, and ask Him to give you opportunities to step out of your comfort zone (dangerous, I know!)⁹

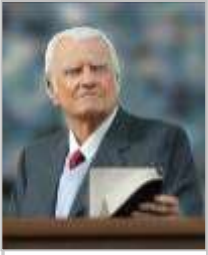

Learning to Pray

How can you make prayer a part of your daily life? Let me suggest six guidelines that have helped me.

Firstly, have the right attitude. A friend of mine likes to define prayer as “a declaration of dependence”, and he has a point. We will only pray when we realise how dependant we are on

God and we trust Him to hear our prayers and answer them according to His will. The Bible reminds us that, “God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble.” (1 Peter 5:4 ^{ESV})

Second, seek God's will in your prayers. God wants us to bring our every concern to Him in prayer and to be persistent. But we don't see the whole picture, and sometimes we ask for things that are unwise or even wrong. James wrote, “When you ask, you do not receive, because you ask with wrong motives.” (James 4:3 ^{NIV}) Ask above all for God's will to be done.

Third, bring everything to God in prayer. God loves us, and He is concerned about every detail of our lives, both big and small. I have known young people who prayed about minor things, but then didn't pray about their choice of college or their career or their future spouse. On the other hand I've also known

people who prayed only when they faced a crisis. The Bible says, "In everything ... present your requests to God." (Philippians 4:6 ^{CSB})

Fourth, learn to pray at all times, and in all situations. Nothing can replace a daily time spent alone with God in prayer. But we also can be in an attitude of prayer throughout the day – sitting in a car or at our desks, working in the kitchen, even talking to someone on the phone. The Bible says, "pray continually." (1 Thess. 5:17 ^{NIV})

Fifth, trust God for the outcome. One of the most frequent questions people ask me concerns unanswered prayer. But God knows what is best for us, and we need to learn to trust Him for the outcome. Sometimes God answers "Yes" when we ask Him for something. But sometimes His answer is "Not yet" or even "No". And sometimes His answer is simply, "Trust Me, even if you don't understand."

Finally, learn to listen. Prayer is speaking to God, but sometimes He uses our prayerful silence to speak to us in return. He may simply give us an inner assurance of His presence, or He may guide us in a certain direction. The Bible says, "Be still before the Lord and wait patiently for Him." (Psalm 37:7 ^{ESV})

Pray because of Jesus' example.

Pray because God has commanded it.

Pray because Christ died to give us access to the Father.

Pray because God is worthy of your praise.

Pray because you need His forgiveness and guidance and protection.

Pray because others need your prayers.

Pray most of all because God wants your fellowship and you need His fellowship on this journey He has set before you.

I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son.

You may ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it.
